LOCAL CREWS DID WELL


The Limerick annual regatta yesterday was somewhat spoiled by intermittent showers. Nevertheless the sport was good and many prizes stayed at home.


There was admiration for Mr. Jack Price, a well-known local sportsman, who in his 48th year, stroked the A.B.C. "B" maiden eight in an emergency.
