THE "IRISH PINE"

TO LEAVE LIMERICK TO-MORROW

Owing to the seamen's strike,
which ended yesterday at the Dub-
lin docks after lasting for three
weeks, the Irish Shipping Com-
pany's vessel, "Irish Pine," was tied
up for several days at the Limerick
Port after her cargo had been dis-
charged.

The termination of the impasse at
the Dublin port means that the
"Irish Pine" will sail again to-mor-
row.

It is expected that the crew will
take up duty either to-night or on
to-morrow (Saturday) morning,
and the vessel will go direct to Mon-
treal, Canada.

There will be also a complement
of passengers on board.

DEATH OF MR. JAMES RAY

A prominent Limerick City busi-
ness man passed away on Wednes-
day night at his residence, "Hill
View," Ennis Road, in the person of
Mr. James Ray. The deceased, who
had been in failing health for the
past two years or so, was a director
of Richard Ray & Co., Roche's St.,
a firm founded by his father. He
was also connected with the Lime-
rick bacon industry. A very estim-
able and widely respected citizen, he
took a great interest in rowing in
his young days, and was an active
and useful oarsman for Limerick
Boat Club. His death removes a
very good type of citizen, and we
join in tendering sincere sympathy
to his bereaved widow, son and
other relatives.

THE HIGH RATES

INQUIRY AGAIN URGED

At a meeting of the Executive
Committee of the Association of
Municipal Authorities held in the
City Hall, Dublin, yesterday, a re-
solution again urging the Minister
for Local Government to inquire
into "the incidence of high rates
throughout the whole country" was
adopted.

Mr. P. L. McEvoy, President of
the Association, told members that
this resolution had previously been
passed in January last and had
asked the Minister to receive a de-
putation from the Association.

Mr. S. MacCathmhaoil, Honorary
Secretary, said that July 5th last
had been provisionally fixed as the
date on which the deputation
should be received, but, owing to
pressure of work in the Dail, the
Minister had postponed that date
and a further date had not yet been
fixed.
