The death occurred, on Monday, after a comparatively brief illness, of Mr. Harry Musgrave, South Quay, Newcastle West, who was one of the town's oldest and most esteemed citizens. Deceased, who had reached a fine old age, belonged to a widely known and respected family, which has been associated with the teaching profession for more than half a century. He was brother of the late James D. Musgrave, one time distinguished Principal of the Newcastle West Courtney School, and uncle of the late Harry Musgrave, former principal of Ardagh National School. The late Mr. Musgrave was a retired teacher, having formerly taught at Newcastle West and Bruff. When he resigned from the profession some years ago he came to reside with his nephew, Mr. James Musgrave, of the Newcastle West Co. Council office staff. He was also uncle of Mr. Joseph Musgrave, electrician, Newcastle West; Miss Kathleen Musgrave, music teacher, Newcastle West; Messrs. Michael and Patrick Musgrave, Dublin, and Mr. Wm. There was a large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place on Tuesday from Newcastle West Parish Church to Churchtown cemetery.
