DEATH OF PRESENTATION SISTER

Rev. Sister Gabriel Bowen, of the Presentation Convent, Castleisland, Co. Kerry, who has died, was a native of Ballingaddy, Killmallock, and was daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. James Bowen, Ballingaddy (writes our Kilmallock correspondent).

Born over 82 years ago, she spent sixty years in religion, celebrating her Diamond Jubilee in 1946. She spent her entire religious life in Castleisland Convent, where she was on the teaching staff. She had three sisters members of the Presentation Order and one a member of the Mercy Order. She was sister of the late Rev. Dr. Bowen, O.S.A., Drogheda, who died recently. She was cousin of the late Sister Colman O'Donnell, Mercy Convent, Charleville, who also died recently.

There was a very large attendance at the interment, which took place in the convent cemetery, Castleisland, and which was attended by a large number of parishioners and past pupils of the deceased.

RETIREES FROM OFFICE

Mr. Michael Killeen, Circuit Court Registrar for Clare, attained the age of 70 on Wednesday, 2nd August, and retired from office (writes our Ennis correspondent). By a coincidence in dates, he was appointed to the position on the 2nd August, 1929, and has thus served 21 years, during which he has enjoyed as a trustworthy and courteous officer the confidence and esteem of all members of the legal profession and the general public. Wednesday, August 2.—Cattle—Supplies forwarded showed a decrease on last Wednesday; good attendance. In beef department, demand active and firm for prime medium weighted heifers, and heifer cows, which were readily bought up at full current values; nice fat, small heifers also in keen request; a fair number of heavy young cows met a much stronger market at advanced rates, and more could have been sold; secondary and older sorts also changed hands satisfactorily; this section of the market almost cleared. No aged or forward stores on offer. Small entry of young stores, plenty of customers for well bred bullocks, which were wanted and sold well at recent rates; choice feeding bullocks and colour dairy heifers met steady sale. Full seasonable turnover and clearance. Fat heifers, best, £44/- to £46 10s.; small, £32 to £36 10s. Fat cows, best, £36 10s. to £43/-; second run, £28 to £36; old, £18 to £25 10s. 2 year-old bullocks, £27 10s. to £30. 1½ year-old bullocks and heifers, £19 5s. to £23 15s.; second run, £15 7s. 6d. to £17. Calves, £14. Sheep—increased entry; a fairly even and good show of mutton; full attendance of buyers; trade somewhat quieter, with purchasers endeavouring to buy at easier terms; on the whole slightly lower rates ruled for fat sheep; prime wethers and hoggets were bid for and wanted, with late rates about repeated; small, handy sized sheep in good condition were in fair demand, but half finished and rougher pens difficult to place unless at reduced rates; young ewe, quiet, steady enquiry for fat hoggets. Increased supply of lambs; choice well bred lambs changed hands at late rates, on the whole somewhat easier rates ruled, and market failed to clear. Increased volume of business transacted, and a good clearance in the sheep section. Fat, middle-weight, 160/- to 160/-; hoggets, best, 160/- to 178/-; second run, 142 6d. to 160/-; small, 120/- to 135/-; ewes, best, 130/- to 147 6d.; lambs, best, 118/- to 125/-; second run, 90/- to 110/- Wm.
