Witness—We won't do anything out of the way any more. I will take an oath on that.

Justice—It is easy for you to take an oath but to keep it is another thing. I am prepared to bind you all to the peace.

The witness pleaded that he and his nephew would leave the city right away and would not come back again.

The Justice said that there was a lot to be said for the unfortunate characters, as he described them. "They don't rob or do any harm only to themselves, but this sort of thing cannot go on," he said.

BOUND TO THE PEACE.

Guard Vaughan gave evidence that at the scene Michael Casey and Martin O'Donoghue were both undressed except for their trousers, and both were drunk. The scene at Pennywell was most disgusting. People were afraid of the two accused and afraid to give evidence against them. The two accused had drink taken on the occasion.

The Justice said there was no evidence to convict the defendants of assault, but he would bind them to the peace for 12 months on their own bonds of £20 each and two sureties of £10 each. In default, they would go to jail for one month.
