DIED ON PATRON'S MARRIED IN TORONTO FEAST

NUN PASSES AWAY

"The Wicklow People," Saturday, August 12th, contained the following notice:

O'GORMAN—August 9th, at the Dominican Convent, Wicklow, Sister Mary Albertus O'Gorman, R.I.P. Interred after Solemn Requiem Mass on Friday (11th August).

The obsequies throughout were conducted by the Dominican Fathers, assisted by the local clergy.

The late Sister Mary Albertus O'Gorman, or Sister Albertus, as she was familiarly known to generations of students and their friends, was a member of the teaching staff of the Dominican Convent, Wicklow, where, as Principal for many years, she taught in both primary and secondary schools. She proved to be an eminent educationalist in the spiritual and temporal fields, and contributed to the convent's reputation for sound progress.

She reached her 75th year when called to her reward, and died on the feast of her patron in religion, St. Albertus. She was 52 years a nun. A native of Scariff, Co. Clare, she was the daughter of parents who had themselves been teachers. Her brother, "Tom" O'Gorman, was up to his demise, in business in Scariff, while another brother, the late Administrator and Parish Priest of Parramatta, Australia, Monsignor John O'Gorman, D.D., P.P., Adm., a Domestic Prelate of the late Pope, was instrumental in co-founding the now highly influential Catholic Press of Australia. He ministered there for many years, and died when home on a visit to Ireland in January, 1931. He is buried in All Hallows' Cemetery, All Hallows, Dublin, being the Alma Mater from whence he set out to the Australian Mission Field when ordained years before.

Sister Albertus is survived by another sister in religion. The deceased was aunt of Miss Bertha O'Gorman, Shannon Airport, and of Mrs. John Ormsby, New Zealand. Other relatives are her sisters-in-law, Mrs. T. O'Gorman and Mrs. P. Duggan, Scariff; Miss Helena Shanahan, Killaloe, and Mrs. J. MacMahon, Homefarm Park, Dublin.
