## BAIL QUESTION

### YOUTHS ON ASSAULT CHARGES

At a special Court held in Ennis on Friday, two youths, aged 17 and 18 years, named Christopher Keane, Nagle's Terrace, Kiltrush, and Michael Kelly, St. Patrick's Terrace, Kiltrush, were charged with assaulting James C. Clancy, Town Clerk, Kiltrush, on 20th August, and causing him grievous bodily harm.

Sergt. S. Lalor applied for a remand as inquiries were not yet completed.

Supt. J. S. Flynn asked that the accused be remanded in custody to the Kiltrush Court on September 5th, when evidence would be tendered. He mentioned that the accused were in possession of travel documents.

Mr. D. Gleeson, solr., defended, and applied for bail. He said the passports held by accused could be handed over to the Garda authorities if the Justice so desired. There was no fear that accused would evade jurisdiction as they had no money for travelling and no place to get it. Solvent sureties could be provided.

Justice Gordon Hurley said the tendency of the Court was to grant bail wherever possible unless reasons put forward by the prosecution were so grave as to be binding on the Court. He granted bail in £100 and two independent sureties of £200 each.

Mr. Gleeson said the sureties were not in Court but they would be provided later.

The Justice said that any time the sureties signed the bonds the accused would be released from custody.

### QUESTION OF PLAYER'S COMPENSATION

Owing to the absence of Limerick County Board officials, the question of compensation to Michael Herbert, who was injured 12 months ago while playing for Ahane, had to be deferred at the meeting of the Munster Council, G.A.A., in Limerick, last Saturday, at which Mr. V. O'Donoghue (Waterford), Chairman, presided.

The matter had been put back at a previous meeting.

The Chairman congratulated Limerick on winning the Munster Junior Football Championship and he paid a glowing tribute to the Gaels of Kilmallock for the manner in which they made arrangements for Munster Championship fixtures at that venue.
