 Number Penned, 1,538.**

On Tuesday, August 29, Messrs. Wm. B. Fitt and Co., held their Annual Lamb, Ram and Ewe Sale at the Paddocks, Limerick. The fixture was favoured with ideal weather. The total entry, 1,539, showed an increase of 145 on last year; the lamb section was easily the largest, and included a big percentage of prime pens, quite a number being of outstanding merit. Generally speaking, the entries were of a most useful description, being well bred and nicely brought out, the major portion being of first-class quality; all round the standard compared most favourably with last year. There was brisk enquiry and active trade for all classes of lambs, Oxford Downs and Suffolks came in for special attention and demand; fat and forward lambs in strong request and drew keen competition; well bred store lambs met firm and ready exchange; small lambs also changed
