LIMERICK MAN DIES IN U.S.

The sudden death of Martin F. O'Leary, which occurred on August 22, at Westport, Connecticut, U.S.A., has come as a decided shock to his many relatives and friends in Ireland and America.

He was a native of Carey's Road, Limerick, and was of strong national tendencies. He was a member of the Friends of Irish Freedom, the Clon na Gael, the Citizens of the Irish Republic, organised by the late Liam Mellows, and was also interested in other patriotic and cultural organisations.

Solemn Requiem Mass for the repose of his soul was celebrated by Rt. Rev. Msgr. Egan in the Church of St. Francis of Rome, Bronx, N.Y., on Friday morning, August 25. Interment was in Gate of Heaven Cemetery, Mount Pleasant, N.Y.

BIGGER PAY FOR "TOMMY"

British Army privates and corporals are to get an increase of 21/- a week in a Government scheme to make life in the army more attractive. A married staff sergeant's pay will be increased to £10 12s. 6d. a week. Officers will get increases ranging from 4/6 a day for a Second Lieutenant to 8/- a day for a Brigadier. The cost to the country will be £68,500,000 a year.

The major award of the day went to the winner of the Grand Challenge Class, which was the English springer, "Grand Lodge." This animal was exhibited by Mr. R. Cleland, Whitehead, County Antrim.

A feature of the day's arrangements was the able stewarding, which went on uninterruptedly from 11 a.m. to 5.30 p.m.

AGAINST SON

Seventeen years old Christopher Clancy, 21 Cregan Ave., Killeely, who, according to his father, had never told the truth, and who was giving bad example to the younger members of the family, pleaded guilty at the City District Court to-day to embezzling £8 5s., the property of Mrs. Lindsay, Patrick Street, Limerick.

The evidence of Detective Officer O'Connor was that Clancy, a messenger boy employed by Mrs. Lindsay, sold £8 5s. worth of tomatoes on her behalf to Limerick shopkeepers, but had given her none of the proceeds. He had spent the money on cigarettes, sweets and pictures.

The boy's father told Justice Gleeson that the defendant had never told the truth to him. He had spent over three years in the Glin Industrial School. "He's a bad example to the three younger boys in the house," he said, "and he annoys his 21 year old sister who keeps house."

The Justice said he didn't like sending the boy to jail, which was the only place he could be sent to. He remanded him on continuing bail for a month for a report from the Probation Officers.

Miss Una Brady, a native of Gort, Co. Galway, and Mr. Ned Rathcliffe, junior, Belfast, were married in Shanaglish Parish Church last week. Mrs. Mary Ryan, of Kilmallock, Co. Limerick, who has died, was widow of the late Mr. James Ryan, Kilmallock. She was aged 79 years.
