Guard Corcoran gave evidence that in conversation with accused the latter said he wondered who burned the hay and after some remarks had been exchanged said: "I did the job all right; I burned the hay." Witness cautioned him, and accused added that he had also damaged the car and interfered with the motor van and thrown the distributor wires into a garden. "I did all the damage that was done," said accused, "and there is no use in denying it. As an Irishman and a Catholic I would not have it on my conscience. Please tell Father O'Donoghue I am sincerely sorry for having interfered with his car and I hope he will forgive me for it. I will compensate him for the damage. I do not know what happened to me. I got a brain wave and could not help it."

Guard P. Tighe said that when accused was interviewed in his own home he asked not to bring the case to Court, as it would cost the ratepayers too much. He also said it would cost too much to bring the pathologist to take finger prints.

Sergt. Davis said that at a special Court at which accused was charged he said: "I am guilty of the whole lot and that is that."

The further taking of depositions was adjourned to Tulla District Court on Thursday, 7th September, and accused remanded in custody.
