A smith made for him an iron hand in which, when riding, he held the bridle. Ever after, he was called "Langley of the iron hand." Cromwell rewarded his gallant efforts by settling on the family extensive estates in East Tipperary, mainly round Coalbrook, Ballingarry, where as an honoured memento, the iron hand was preserved by his descendants. They also retained a copy of serio-comic verses apparently written much later by an admirer.
