PUBLICAN FINED

CASE AT BALLYNEETY COURT

John Spellacy, publican, Ballysheedy, near Limerick, was at Ballyneety Court, before Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., on Thursday of last week, prosecuted for a breach of the licensing laws on Sunday, 6th August.

Guard Sullivan gave evidence of visiting the premises on the date mentioned and finding the front door open at 5.15 p.m. He found three non-bona fides there. The publican's wife was behind the bar, and she said that the three men were looking for a drink. He called attention to the door being open, but no reply was made to witness.

Mr. A. J. Blood-Smyth, solicitor, who appeared for the licensee, admitted the offence, and said that the three men were working at hay for a neighbour, who was sick. The neighbour's wife gave each of them the price of a drink, and they persuaded the licensee to give them a drink.

The Justice imposed a fine of 20/- on the publican and 2/- each on the three men.

DEATH OF MR. CECIL SLADE, C.E.

A member of a very old Limerick family, he was held in high regard and esteem in his own immediate circle. The Justice said he would dismiss the charge of dangerous driving but would impose a fine of 10/- on the summons for failing to stop after the accident.

Mr. Lavan—Defendant says he wasn't aware of any accident and that if he was he would have gone back to investigate. He has been driving for over 20 years and has a very good record.

BOUND TO STOP.

The Justice said he was satisfied that there was nothing previously against the defendant as a driver, but under the Act he was bound to stop after an accident in which his vehicle was involved. He should have gone back and satisfied himself that nothing was wrong. Admittedly defendant looked back and thought nothing was wrong, but that was not sufficient.

The Justice later reduced the penalty to 1/-, but allowed £2 13s. expenses.
