The Secretary read a letter from the County Council in respect of communication from the Guild requesting a grant for repair of Eflin and Kilquane Cemetery which it was stated that the Engineer had been referred to the County Engineer for an estimate, and the Council will again write to the Guild.

A full discussion took place concerning the recent visit of the County Engineer to the site of the Eflin Central Creamery was received by a deputating consisting of joint members of Muintir na Tire Council and representatives of the Eflin Dairy-operative Society when they put forward for better roads in the parish. As a result of consultations work has commenced on the roads, and correspondence was read from the Engineer to say that the next years would see better roads in the parish.

It was then pointed out that the County Council could not take to remove the banks accumulated on the sides of the road, and it was proposed to request the neighbouring farmers to assist in removing it where roads would then be much safer for traffic. It is now hoped with the promise of better roads the suspended one-day-a-week service to Limerick would be operating for the benefit of the people of the parish.

Members expressed their appreciation, and were pleased that the Guild's efforts in the matter were successful.

Sanitation at Eflin school was also discussed, and the meeting decided on writing to Dr. Moran requesting him to have the necessary arrangements at the school inspected.

Members spoke of the necessity for public pumps at Legane and eleven at Ballymac, being without a public supply. The meeting requested the Secretary to write to the County Council concerning the matter.

The next meeting will be held on Thursday, 5th October.
