The time was 27.6 seconds, .6 of a second outside the pool record, held by Kearney. The ladies senior squadron Munster Championship was retained by Sunday's Well, who won easily from Shannon, the only other squad competing. Marjorie O'Leary (Sunday's Well), with a total of 45 points, won the ladies springboard diving Munster Championship from Patsy Ross, two points behind in second place. Patsy dived exceptionally well and was considered unlucky not to have won.

O'Donnell Cup.
