REBUFF FOR REDS

U.N.O. AND CHINESE SEAT

By 33 votes to 16, with 10 abstentions, the United Nations' Assembly in New York last night refused to give China's seat on the Security Council to the Communist regime of Mao Tse Tung.

India, the United Kingdom and the Soviet Union were among the nations who supported the election of Communist China.

The Russian delegate declared that the action of the Assembly in not giving the seat to the Communist regime was illegal and incorrect.

The question of which side in China should represent that country on the Assembly was ultimately referred to a special Committee of seven members of that body.

Replying to Mr. Lavan, witness said Lane could have caught Harnett's pullover and pulled it lightly.

The Justice said he would adjourn his decision in this case until he was deciding the first action at the next Court.
