DEATH OF MR. M. FOLEY, BALLINVALLIG

Mr. Michael Foley, Ballinvallig,
 Newcastle West, who died on Mon-
 day after a comparatively brief ill-
 ness, was member of a highly es-
 teemed and widely respected West
 Limerick farming family. He was
 a life-long Nationalist and was for
 many years Chairman of the New-
 castle West Fianna Fail Cumann,
 of which he was one of the most
 active and energetic members. He
 was also prominently identified
 with the local Coursing Club. His
 kindly and genial disposition en-
 deared him to a wide circle of rela-
 tives and friends and his demise is
 widely regretted. Sincere sympathy
 will be tendered to the bereaved
 family. The remains were removed
 to Newcastle West Parish Church
 on Tuesday evening and the
 funeral took place to Churchtown
 Cemetery on Wednesday.
