### LIMERICK MAN IN NIGERIA

PROMOTED

The following news item has been sent us by the British Colonial Office, Sanctuary Buildings, Great Smith Street, London :

An Irishman, who was born in Limerick City, has recently been promoted to the post of executive engineer (Grade I), in the Public Works Department, Nigeria. Britain's largest dependency.

He is Mr. J. W. Stokes, who lives the Bungalow, Strand, Limerick. Mr. Stokes was first appointed to the Public Works-Department in November, 1936. From 1939 to 1945 he served with the West African Forces in the East African and Burma Campaigns, and returned to Nigeria in 1946.

The Department to which Mr. Stokes belongs is responsible for the maintenance of 25,000 miles of road, 30 agrodromes, a large number of water supplies, and it employs nearly 32,000 men, of whom 320 are Europeans.
