Adjourned Case

DISMISSAL AT CITY COURT

AN adjourned case against Denis Clarke, publican, 42 Roche's Street, Limerick, who was charged with a breach of the licensing laws at 2.10 a.m. on July 15th, was heard before Justice Gleeson at the Limerick District Court to-day.

Supt. P. Colleran prosecuted, and Mr. M. O.B. Kelly, solr., appeared for the licensee. Mr. D. G. O'Donovan represented three men found on the premises.

Guard O'Shea gave evidence that he was on duty with Guard Hannigan on the night in question. As he approached the premises he noticed a light. On closer inspection he heard the sound of glasses and money being rattled in the bar portion. When satisfied that there were persons other than the licensee on the premises he knocked and was admitted immediately, by Denis Clarke.

NO SIGNS OF DRINK

There were three men in the bar, but he found no signs of drink having been consumed there. He noticed a whiskey bottle, uncorked, roughly quarter full, inside the bar counter. When asked to account for this the defendant did not reply.

Guard Hannigan corroborated, and when asked by Mr. O'Donovan if he were aware that all three men were harmen, he replied that he knew two of them were.

Denis Clarke, defendant, swore that two of the men found on the premises had given him help during the night as he was particularly busy. The third person was also a harman and called for one of the others at about 11 p.m. He knew this man and invited him to join the others in an upstairs sitting-room. There was no payment for whatever drinks were supplied. When the Guards called all defendants were leaving, and as he did not reside on the premises he was removing the cash.

NO PAYMENT

Mr. O'Donovan called the man who entered the bar latest and he, in evidence, said that no payment was made for drink.

The Justice, giving his decision, said he believed the evidence of both defendants and would accordingly dismiss the case on the merits.
