This alb of Limerick lace was made specially for his Lordship by the Good Shepherd Convent, and those in a position to judge speak eloquently of the neatness and delicacy of the needlework and general execution of the work. This is a high and deserved tribute to the gifted hands of those who made it.

The design of the alb is Celtic and it was taken from the Book of Kells. The Papal Arms are embroidered on it, and included are the traditional keys of the Holy See, with tiara, and doves bearing olive branches. There is also artistic lace on the sleeves, which are backed with white satin. The Holy Father will, no doubt, be immensely pleased with this treasured gift; more so when it is known that it was made by the Good Shepherd Convent, whose Cardinal Protector in Rome is none other than His Holiness.
