COMMUNISTS STRIKE IN AUSTRIA

The general strike which was
arranged by Communists to take
place in Austria this morning has
not so far had the effect that the
Reds had planned.

The strike was called by the
Communists as a protest against
the Government's failure to revise
wages and prices.

Attempts were made in Vienna
this morning to stop tram
drivers from taking out their tram
cars, while other Communists
tried to disturb the smooth work-
ing of the railways and some pro-
minent newspaper offices.

Up to late this afternoon there
had been no concentrations of
strikers in Vienna, but 5,000
workers in the Soviet Zone of
Austria came out on strike.

It was stated generally that the
planned strike was abortive.

COUNTY FINANCES

BANK OVERDRAFT

Limerick County Council to-day
authorised the seeking of bank over-
draft accommodation for £25,000 for
the Regional Hospital and District
Water and Sewerage Scheme.

County Secretary T. F. Broe said
the Council would later be looking
for a loan, but at the moment there
was a problem of what part of the
repayment of that loan the city
would have to bear.

The Council also authorised over-
draft accommodation of £200,000 on
the roads and general accounts.

OVER 60 YEARS A NUN

The death has occurred at the
Good Shepherd Convent, Toronto,
Canada, of Sister Mary Bernard
(Hehir), daughter of the late Mr.
and Mrs. Andrew Hehir, of Bushy
Park, Ennis. She joined the Good
Shepherd Order sixty-three years
ago, celebrated her Golden Jubilee
in April, 1937, and was aged 90
when she died. Her last visit to
Ireland was in 1932, when she
attended the Eucharistic Congress
and called on her relatives in
County Clare. She is survived by
two sisters, Mrs. J. F. Glynn,
Knockaderry, Ennis, and Mrs. B.
Hegarty, of Kilcross, Fountain
Ennis.
