COMMITTEES TO BE SET UP

When the newly elected City Council holds its second meeting on Monday evening next a number of Committees or subsidiary bodies will be set up. These include the Vocational Education Committee and Municipal Art Gallery. The first-named consists of fourteen members, but not more than eight can be members of the Council. This means that at least six "extern" persons must be appointed.

The Council will also appoint representatives on the following bodies—Limerick Mental Hospital (five members), Governors of Barrington's Hospital (three), Board of Management, St. John's Hospital (five), two delegates on the Municipal Authorities' Association, one representative on the Irish Tourist Board.

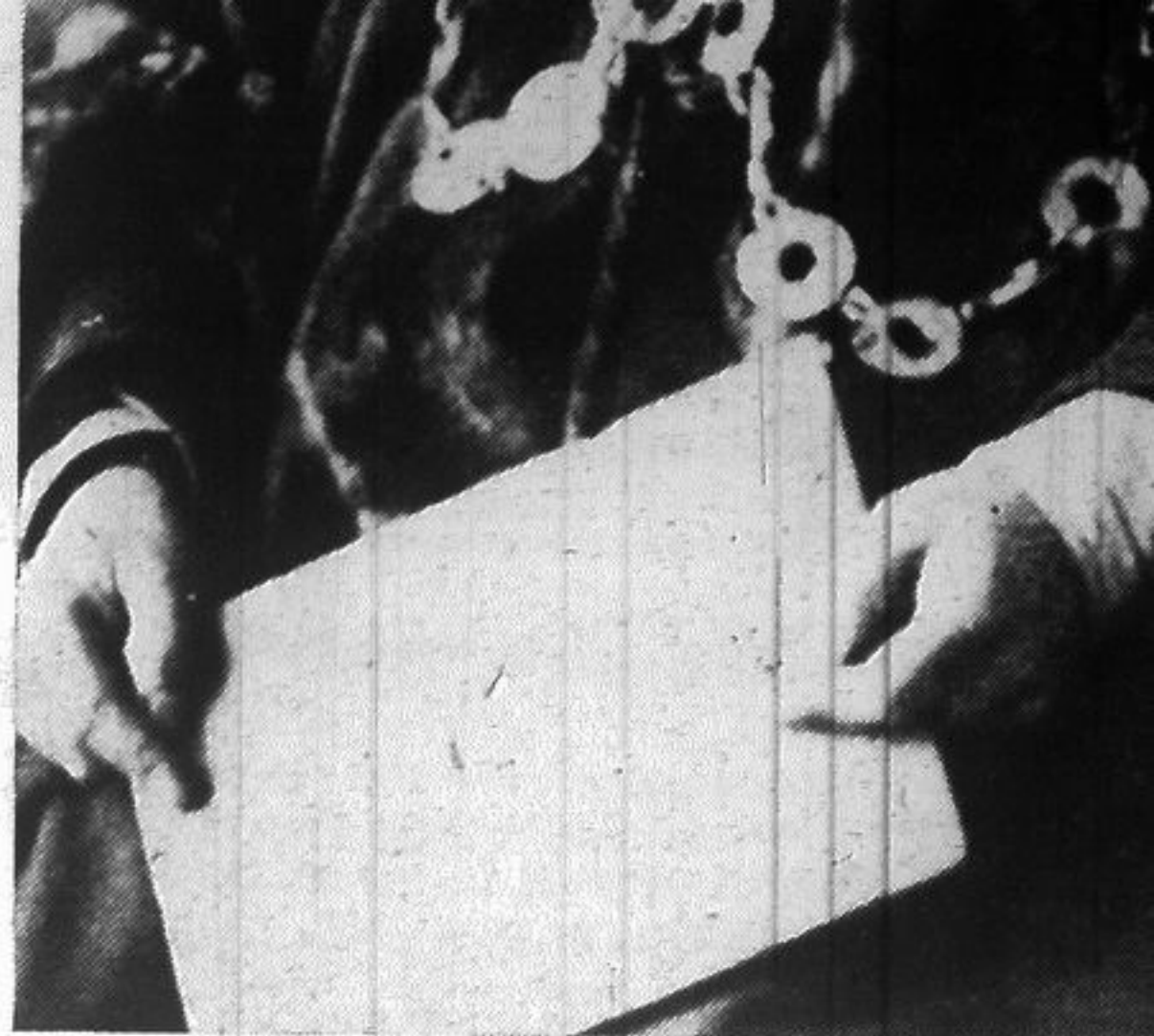
The funeral to-day, following Requiem Mass in Raheen Church, to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery, was fully representative of all sections of the community.

Thomas Fitzgerald, Kilmihill, Co. Clare, was fined 10/- in the Limerick District Court to-day by Justice Gleeson. He had been charged with using a small public service vehicle for commercial purposes.

Guard Patrick McKenna, who brought the case, said he found Fitzgerald carrying bread in his small hackney car. The defendant, a shopkeeper, had an £8 tax for the car. If he wanted to carry merchandise in the car he should have taxed it for £12.

BRIGADE CALLED TO TWO OUTBREAKS

HOW IT

The Limerick Fire Brigade was summoned yesterday to cope with two outbreaks of fire on farms. The first call was to Maypark, Ballykeeffe, Mungret (the property of Mrs. M. Galligan), where 5 tons of hay were on fire. After a short time the outbreak was subdued.

The second call was to the farm of Mr. J. Moloney, Killenoughty, Croom, where 50 tons of hay were on fire. At this outbreak the City Brigade was assisted by the County Brigade from Rathkeale. The hay suffered considerable damage before the fire was got under control.
