SUDDEN COLLAPSE IN CHURCH

Mr. Thomas O'Keeffe, Kilfrush, Knocklong, farmer, over 60 years of age, collapsed at Knocklong Mass on Sunday and died almost immediately. He was a quiet and unassuming person, who was a favourite in the district and was a native of Herbertstown, where his death is also mourned.
He is survived by two brothers, a sister and nieces and nephews, with whom the deepest sympathy is felt.
The remains were conveyed to Hospital Parish Church on Sunday evening, and, after Office and Requiem Mass on Monday, the funeral took place to the family burial ground, in the presence of a large and representative gathering.

COMING CONFERENCE

Limerick City Council at Monday night's meeting had a letter from the Harbour Board requesting co-operation in the calling of a meeting soon between representatives of the Board, the City and Co. Councils and the Clare Co. Council for the purpose of getting the outside bodies to guarantee repayment of a loan of £100,000 the Board intended raising in its port development scheme.
The City Manager (Mr. M. Macken) told the Council that he had already taken steps to convene a meeting of representatives

and arm muscles, while the shoulder was affected by the wasting.
