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READ SECRET DOCUMENT Death Of Hugh O'B. Moran

HIS SINN FEIN ACTIVITIES

THE death of Mr. Hugh O'Brien Moran, Co. Registrar, which took place at his residence, "Mantua," North Circular Road, Limerick, has evoked feelings of the deepest regret and sorrow.

He was the younger son of the late James Hishon Moran, one of the best known solicitors in Ireland in his time. After a brilliant secondary course at Mungret College, the future County Registrar studied law and in 1910 he was admitted a solicitor.

On his release from prison he was accorded a public welcome when he arrived at the Limerick Railway Terminus. A huge gathering, including the city bands, assembled at the station to greet him amidst striking scenes of enthusiasm.

On the establishment of the Free State, Mr. Moran was appointed State Solicitor for Limerick, and subsequently when the Circuit Courts were set up he became County Registrar for Limerick, an office he held up to the time of his death.

Mr. Moran is survived by three sons—Dr. Aodh Moran, Dr. Seamus Moran and Mr. Ed. Moran, L.D.S., and a daughter—Mrs. Frank O'Mahony. His brother, Very Rev. James McDermott, O.M.I., is one of the most distinguished members of the Oblate Order.

His surviving sister, Sr. Mary Patrick is a member of the Community of the Sisters of Charity. In private life the late Mr. Moran was a most genial personality. His courteous and kindly disposition endeared him to all who ever came in contact with him.

It should be of interest to mention that Mr. Moran's godfather was that famous Irish patriot, William O'Brien, M.P., who was on very intimate terms with his father. At the baptismal ceremony the infant was given the additional name of O'Brien a name he honoured and respected throughout his life.

The remains were removed on Saturday evening to St. Munchin's Church amidst many manifestations of regret and sorrow. The funeral cortege yesterday to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery was one of the largest seen in Limerick for many years.

Very Rev. Father Moran conducted the service at the graveside. At 10 o'clock this morning in St. Munchin's Church, office and Requiem High Mass was celebrated. There was a large congregation.

A vote of sympathy with the family of the late Mr. O'Brien Moran was unanimously passed by the Limerick District Mental Hospital Board last Saturday on the proposition of Mr. Sean Hartney, Co. Co.

Mr. Hartney said they were all aware of the late Co. Registrar's national activities when they were needed most.

TWO KILLED

Motor Cycle Tragedy

CRASH INTO TREE AT BEND

TWO young men were killed last night in a motor cycle accident at Tankardstown, midway between Bansa and Cahir, Co. Tipperary.

O'Shea was a motor mechanic at Messrs. Carroll's Garage, Tipperary, and Gallagher was employed as a builder's labourer at Bansa.

One of the two, stated to be O'Shea, was riding a motor bicycle with Gallagher riding pillion and some time around eight o'clock, as they were travelling from the direction of Cahir in the direction of Tipperary, the cycle apparently got out of control at a bend in the road at Tankardstown and struck a tree on the roadside fence.

A neighbouring farmer, Mr. Thomas Smithwick, who witnessed the crash, says he found one man killed outright and that the other died in a few minutes.

The wrecked cycle was on top of the bodies. A passing car brought word to Bansa Civic Guards Barracks and Dr. James Russell was quickly on the scene and found both men dead.

The bodies were conveyed to Bansa, where they were laid in the premises of the Young Farmers' Club pending an inquest this evening.

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DOLLAR INCOME

How It May Be Increased

IMPORTANCE OF AMERICAN TOURISTS

(To the Editor, "Limerick Leader.") SIR—The American dollar, for so long an important factor in many countries' calculations has become, since the war, one of their vital considerations.

First, how to get it, and then how most prudently to spend it. In Ireland, as generally elsewhere, in countries where currencies are now tied, the financial authorities of government are most favourably placed to judge how best in existing world conditions their dollars should be disposed.

Whether or not they use their resources to the best advantage, it is evident—ultimately the responsibility of the people. But so far as the acquisition of dollars is concerned, there is a great deal that can be done by the people at all times.

MANY INTERESTS HELPING. In Ireland at present there are many interests helping the country to build up its dollar assets. The greatest of these is the one which, without effort, and through relationship and friendship with the United States, is receiving remittances from the American people each day, year in and out. Second in importance at the moment is the dollar revenue being received through the money spent in Ireland by American tourists, and other visitors from North America.

In this field there is still an enormous potential revenue available to be earned; and it should be a great source of encouragement to all Irishmen to see the active steps now about to be undertaken by the Government to further this object.

But it is not enough just to applaud the authorities for doing something which might well have been done long ago. It is of immediate importance to give them all possible assistance; for everyone's interest lies in attracting here one of the currencies which has at least a welcome appearance of stability, and whose owners show so many indications of willingness to bestow it upon us.

It is important for everyone in this country to realise that they will ultimately benefit in some way from each dollar spent by Americans. There are reliable American statistics to show that only about 35 per cent. of each tourist dollar goes to the hotel industry. The balance is divided between stores, beverages, non-hotel restaurants, entertainments, sightseeing, etc., so that nearly every individual is actually engaged, directly or indirectly, in an occupation which should benefit by dollar spending.

If we all become conscious of these possibilities, it will go far towards creating a situation analogous with countries such as Switzerland, which have maintained a very stable currency, largely through a highly developed technique in handling tourists.
