AFTER SIX YEARS Burial With Military Honours GOT ORDER OF THE PURPLE HEART

MRS. M. A. DOWNEY, 20 Summerhill, Ennis, has just returned from attending the interment in Arlington Cemetery, Virginia, U.S.A., of the casket containing the remains of her son, Michael, who died as the result of wounds received in the late World War whilst serving with the U.S.A. military forces. Michael, who emigrated in 1928, was a Technical Sergeant in the Army Air Force when, on November 10th, 1943, he was entrusted with the execution of an important secret mission against the Japanese in Rabaul, New Guinea.

TRIBUTE IN CITATION.

He carried out his mission successfully but was so badly wounded that he died a month later. The Order of the Purple Heart was conferred upon him and, in a citation issued by Lieut-General H. H. Arnold, General Officer commanding the U.S. Air Forces, it was set out that "he gave his life in the performance of his duty; he lived to bear his country's arms; he died to save its honour. He was a soldier and he knew a soldier's duty."

The hero's remains were removed, after lying six years in Rabaul, to the U.S.A. for burial with full military honours.

MOTHER PRESENTED WITH HIS DECORATIONS.

Mrs. Downey, his widowed mother, flew from Shannon to attend the sad ceremony and was afterwards presented with all the medals and decorations won by her son. He was only 32 years of age at the date of his death in far-off New Guinea.

CATTLE STOLEN Four Englishmen Charged

ARRESTS IN LIMERICK

INTENSE Garda activity followed the disappearance of three beautiful cattle from a field near Nenagh this week. It ended last Wednesday night when three members of the force in Limerick arrested in Bedford Row four Englishmen whom they charged with rustling the cattle.

The cattle which the four men are charged with stealing were the property of Mr. Anthony Hanly, Grange, Nenagh. They were discovered in Granard, where attempts had been made to sell them.

HELD IN CUSTODY

The four Englishmen arrested—all said to be natives of Leicester—gave their names as William David Simpson (18), his father, John Simpson, Richard Goodrich and Richard Lodge. They are being held in custody for Roscrea District Court on Monday morning next, when they will be formally charged with the theft of the cattle.

Immediately after their arrest in Limerick, the four were brought before Mr. Patrick Cross, Peace Commissioner, who took formal depositions and remanded them to Roscrea.

The officers who made the arrest are Inspector T. Griffin, Detective Sergeant Murphy and Sergeant John Hanrahan.

It is understood that the accused made statements after being charged.

BROUGHT OVER BIG SALOON CAR
