PROMINENT FIGURE WHO SERVED NATIONAL CAUSE

Mr. Daniel McCartan, solicitor, Newcastle, Co. Down, who died recently at an advanced age, had associations with Newcastle West, where two of his daughters are married to prominent and esteemed residents (writes our special representative in Newcastle West). Deceased, who had reached the fine old age of 84 years, was one of the leading members of the legal profession in the North and was a life-long and sterling supporter of the national movement in the Six Counties. He took out his B.A. degree in London University and on completing his studies for the final examination of the legal profession he achieved the distinction of securing first place, which carried with it the award of a gold medal. Later he became prominently identified with the nationalist movement in Co. Down, where he rendered invaluable services in protecting the interests of the nationalist voters in the preparation of the voters' register. In 1917 he was appointed Clerk of the Peace for Co. Down and it is believed that he was the first Catholic to hold that important post. He was a close personal friend of Mr. Joe Devlin, M.P., and other Northern nationalist leaders.

The late Mr. McCartan is survived by two sons and four daughters, two of whom, as already indicated, are married in Newcastle West. They are Mrs. R. J. Cussen
