HOUSES IN CATHERINE

PLACE

In the Limerick Circuit Court yesterday, Judge Barra O Briain heard an appeal by Theobald Fitzwalter Butler and Annabella Lady Seeds, against a new valuation put on 2 and 3, Catherine Place, of which they are landlords.

Mr. J. Kenny, B.L. (instructed by Messrs. Fitt & Co., solicitors), said the original valuation of each house was £14. Recently it was increased to £25. Both houses were over a hundred years old, and had been continuously in the occupation of tenants for the past fifty years. There was positive evidence of a 1914 letting.

John Thompson, architect, said each of the two houses was in very poor repair. It would cost at least £1200 to put them back into a reasonable condition. Spreading that sum over a period of years he said would mean that the annual maintenance cost would be about £100.

Louis de Courcy, auctioneer, said a fair letting value for 3, Catherine Place, would be £65, landlord paying rates.

Mr. N. Cooke, B.L. (instructed by Mr. M. M. Power, State Solicitor), for the City Manager, said he did not propose to go into evidence.

His Lordship said that on the figures before him he would reduce the valuation on each house to £23.
