Upon Judge Sarsfield found guilty of high treason and pronounced sentence of death. Sir listened cheerfully, and only cried that he was glad that who harmed his body, had power over his soul. His heart's desire was to obey the Holy whose communion he had to die.

was carried on a cart to the of execution outside the city. the scaffold he commended himself to the saints, and showed as contentment and joy as if he going to a sumptuous feast. was offered pardon, restitution of lands, and preferment, if he would take the oath of Supremacy to Protestant service. He said that he would not for all the offend God, and that he had loved and abominated all.

When Sir John was hanged and breathed his last, some noble petitioned that his body should not be subjected to any further indignation. This was granted, and he was buried in St. John's Grave on December 20th, 1606.

In an act of reparation, Patrick Sarsfield, the nephew of Judge Dominic Sarsfield, and his wife, placed the beautiful chalice intended with their names. This chalice, used by the martyrs, hidden during Cromwellian and Penal days, has now been left the City of Limerick. Associated with the chalice is the Shrine of Our Lady of Limerick, dedicated in the same year.
