FATALLY BURNED

**Little Girl's Death
FROCK CAUGHT FIRE**

A VERY sad occurrence took place at Newport on Monday morning, October 23rd, when Breda Healy (5½) received extensive burns when, it is believed, her frock caught fire from a piece of candle which she had lighted through the bars of a turf range at her home at Ard Mhuire. Breda, the eldest of four sisters, was in the kitchen while her mother had gone for the morning milk, leaving a smouldering fire in the range.

COVERED HERSELF WITH BLANKETS

On her clothing taking fire the girl ran to the bedroom, where she covered herself with blankets. There, Mrs. Healy found her on her return a few minutes later. The room was then full of smoke and the child's garments lay burned on the floor. The middle of the bed was partly burned.

Dr. W. O'Dwyer, Newport, gave medical attendance to the child almost immediately, and had her conveyed to Nenagh Hospital, where she died 10 hours later.

The circumstances of the tragedy were investigated by Dr. A. W. Courtney, Coroner, at an inquest at Nenagh Hospital, on Tuesday afternoon.

CORONER'S REMARKS.

Having heard the evidence, the Coroner remarked that it was very fortunate all the children were not burned.

Returning a verdict that death was due to shock and cardiac failure following burns accidentally received, the Coroner expressed sympathy with the parents of the child.

Dr. O'Dwyer and Inspector Nolan, G.S., joined in the expres- sion of condolence.
