A prominent business man in London passed away recently in the person of Mr. David Cussen, only son of Edward and Mary Cussen, 1st of Dunboyne, County Meath, and of Shand, Shaughbolen, Co. Limerick. The deceased left home at the age of 17 for London, where he entered upon what proved a most successful commercial career. Possessing keen natural intelligence and the highest qualities of uprightness, he quickly won recognition as a man of more than ordinary ability and enterprise. His success was rapid and on sure foundations, and at the time of his death he was the owner of several important and lucrative business concerns in London. His death removes a deservedly popular and widely esteemed figure, and severs a link with a number of the most prominent and highly respected families in Limerick City and County.

The deceased was educated at Belvedere College and joined his uncle, the late P. D. Cussen, in business in London. His death took place suddenly at his residence, Dapdune, Garland's Road, Leatherhead, Surrey.
