TWO BROTHERS DIE WITHIN MONTH IN U.S.A.

Two exiled brothers, members of a well known and esteemed West Limerick family, died recently in Chicago, U.S.A., within a month of each other. They were Mr. Denny Shanahan and Mr. Joseph Shanahan, formerly of Rathcahill, Newcastle West, and both emigrated to the States many years ago. The late Mr. Denny Shanahan will be best remembered by older residents in his native parish as one of the outstanding hurlers of the famous Monegae team of thirty-four or thirty-five years ago. He was formerly Manager of the Creamery at the Old Mill, Newcastle West, and he subsequently emigrated to the United States, where he became a contractor in Chicago. The other brother, Mr. Joseph Shanahan, emigrated to the United States some forty years ago and was for a number of years a member of the Panama and other police forces. He visited the homeland on three occasions and some years ago retired to private life in Chicago. Deceased were brothers of Mr. Ned Shanahan, ex-D.M.P., Dublin, and of Mr. Michael Shanahan, Rathcahill. They were cousins of Mr. Bill Shanahan, ex-D.M.P., Strand, Newcastle West.
