STRAYING PONY WAS BIG FIGURE A "Swop" And Court Case In Life Of English Town

SUSPENSORY SENTENCE

BEFORE Justice C. S. Kenny, B.L., at Newcastle West Court

George Hennessy, of Ballykevin, Ballingarry, was summoned for alleged larceny of a pony value £4, the property of Henry O'Grady, Ballybrood, Caherconlish.

Supt. Cooney prosecuted, and Mr. R. J. Cussen, solr., was for the defence.

Mr. Cussen said their defence was that they took this pony on the public road, where it was straying for a long time, and they intended to give it up to the owner if he turned up.

Henry O'Grady stated that he bought the pony from a man named Ryan on the 1st of March. He lent the pony to a neighbour, and subsequently found it was missing. He reported to the Guards at Caherconlish, and he travelled a lot of country looking for it. He got some information about it and found it was in Kilmeedy.

A SWOP.

Timothy O'Regan, Kilmeedy, said that he heard Hennessy had a pony for sale, and he swopped a pony he (witness) had for the pony Hennessy had, and he paid 50/- in addition in the exchange. The pony was in good condition when he got it.

Sergeant Clifford, Ballingarry, stated that defendant told him "he found this pony and took it." The defendant was a farm labourer. He had not been in Court before.

The defendant stated, in reply to Mr. Cussen, that the animal was straying around the public road. He took him, and when the owner turned up, he said, he would give him back. He had him for a few months, and as nobody turned up he swopped him.

Cross-examined by Supt. Cooney—Defendant said he did not know it was an offence.

SUSPENSORY SENTENCE.

The Justice said he would impose a suspensory sentence of 2 months, not to be enforced if defendant was of good behaviour for six months. The defendant must pay 50/-, which he received in the exchange of the ponies, and £4 7s. expenses, before the 30th November.

DEATH OF CO. LIMERICK DOCTOR

A PROMINENT Co. Limerick doctor practising for 54 years in Warrington, England, died there on the 1st inst. He was Dr. James Dore Liston, a native of Lisniska, Knockaderry. His father, the late Michael Liston, was a member of the old Newcastle West Board of Guardians for many years before the passing of the Local Government Act of 1898. Coming of highly respected stock on both sides, Dr. Liston was a man of many fine principles and characteristics and was held in the warmest esteem. In the professional and general life of his adopted town he was a big figure who had won high appreciation for his several good qualities.

AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

The following obituary appeared in the "Warrington Guardian" dated 4th inst—:

"The town's oldest medical practitioner, 80-year-old Dr. James Dore Liston, died in the General Hospital after a short illness on Wednesday. He was in practice in Warrington for 54 years and was in his surgery at 6 Academy Street until a week ago.

"Dr. Liston was born at Lisniska, Co. Limerick, and obtained his L.R.C.P., L.R.C.S. and L.R.F.P.S. in 1894, after studying at the Royal College of Surgeons, Edinburgh.

"He began his practice in Warrington in 1896 and was elected by the employees of Joseph Crossfields and Sons, Ltd., to be their medical attendant for eleven years. For 22 years he was medical attendant to the community of nuns at the Convent in Buttermarket St. He was a member of the British Medical Association.

APPOINTED MANAGER OF SCHOOL.

"In 1933, Dr. Liston was appointed a member of the Education Committee and a manager of St. Mary's School. He was for many years a regular worshipper at St. Mary's Church.

"Surviving are his widow, three sons (one a solicitor in Crowdon and two in California—one a doctor and one in commerce), a daughter whose husband is a Rotherham doctor, fifteen grandchildren and three great grandchildren."

Requiem Mass was said in St. Mary's Church, Warrington, where the interment took place on Saturday, 4th instant.
