IMPORTANT TALKS.

Following the exchange of views that took place at the conference held between the City Council, Harbour Board and representatives of the County Councils of Limerick and North Tipperary there is good reason to believe that these local authorities will guarantee a loan of £100,000 for the Harbour Commissioners. This sum is needed so that the full scheme of development works may be carried out. The job is estimated to cost £300,000. The Government will contribute £100,000 leaving the Commissioners to provide the balance. As present port revenue is only sufficient to repay a loan of £100,000, the Harbour Board is seeking the co-operation of the local authorities to act as guarantors for the raising of the third £100,000.
