## DEATH OF MR. J. S. MACNEICE

The death of Mr. J. S. MacNeice, City Coroner, which took place yesterday, has occasioned deep regret and sorrow. He had reached an advanced age and owing to failing health he was unable to be out and about for some time past. He was pre-deceased by his wife by only three weeks, and just a fortnight ago he tendered his resignation from the office of Coroner, to take effect on 31st December next.

The late Mr. MacNeice was a member of a well-known Limerick family, and up to his retirement some years ago, carried on business as an estate and insurance agent. He was appointed Coroner for Limerick in 1919, during the First Dail, and had, through the troubled period, acted as a Judge of the Sinn Fein Courts. Since he did not possess the statutory qualifications, a Special Act of the Dail was later passed to confirm him in office.

Much sympathy will be extended to his sons, brothers and grandchildren in their bereavement.
