It was expected that borings, in addition to surface surveys, would be made to appraise the value of the seams discovered, but such operations found no place amongst the many useful schemes introduced by the various Governments.

Now that fuel of every kind is so badly needed, it might be possible to find something to offset the worry and expense of coal imports from the Continent or elsewhere.

Seventy years ago the landlord of Athea district brought over from Wales a number of miners to Cratloe, who found large quantities of anthracite coal, which was then used by blacksmiths even in Newcastle West. Even this experiment was not operated deep enough to realise its full value or content.

It appears to be that we are in the midst of coal with none to burn.
