

EXPORT OF HORSES FOR SLAUGHTER

The Central Council of the Irish Societies for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, at its half yearly meeting, discussed the efforts being made in Ireland to move the Government to permit the export of dressed carcasses of horses as an alternative to the export of live horses for slaughter on the Continent. The view is held, drawn by some, that the

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
