INCREASE IN RENTS.

Rents of Corporation houses in Limerick, as elsewhere, have increased enormously since 1939. In the years between 1932 and 1939 rents, according to the class of scheme involved, whether economic or uneconomic, varied from 4/- per week to 13/6 per week. Economic rents, in some instances, are as high as 25/- per week, while the minimum rent is 11/-. Apart altogether from soaring prices in respect of general commodities, the advance in rents affects very seriously the cost of living. Yet we are told that there is no upward trend. What a fallacy!
