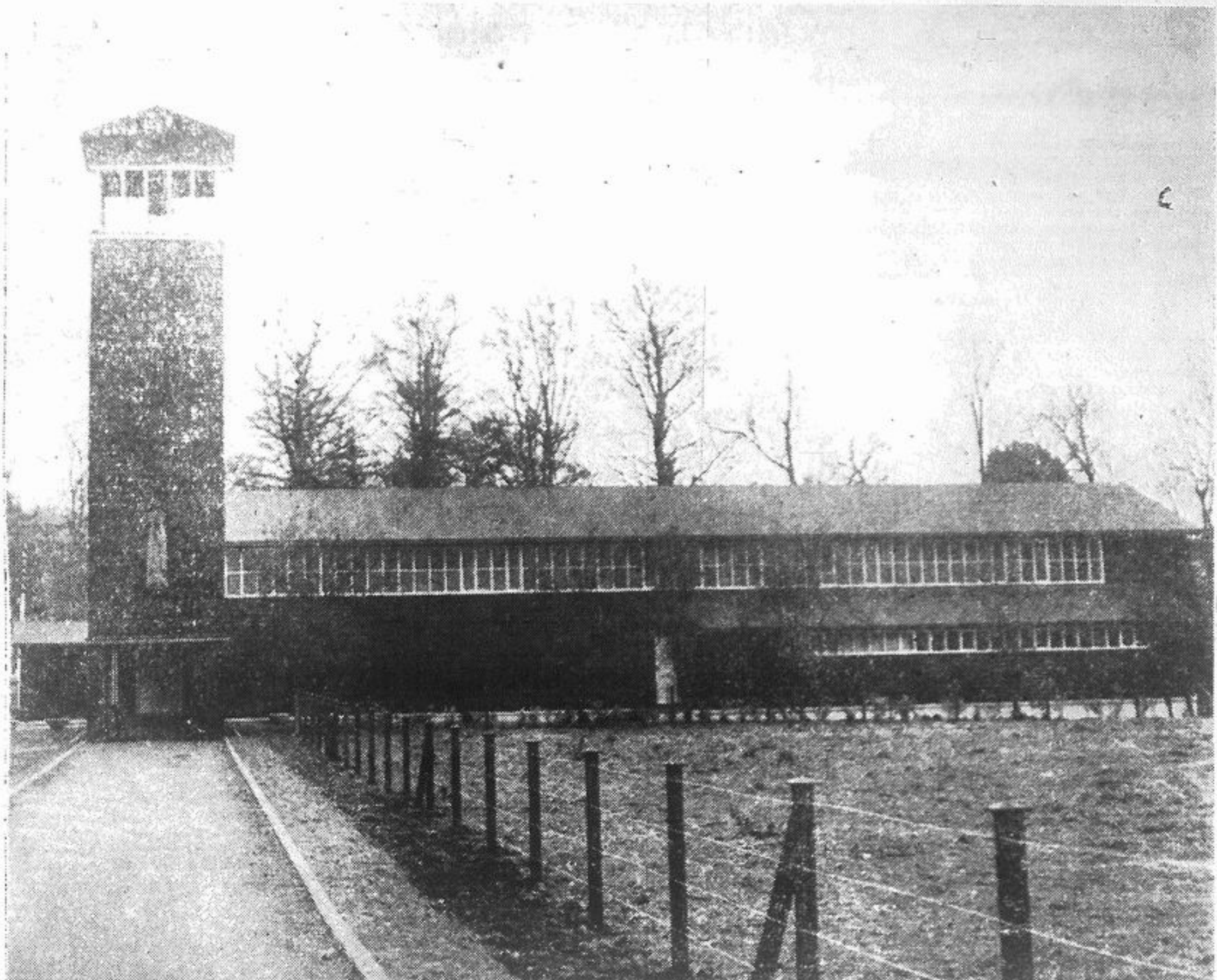


# CHURCH OF OUR LADY OF THE ROSARY
