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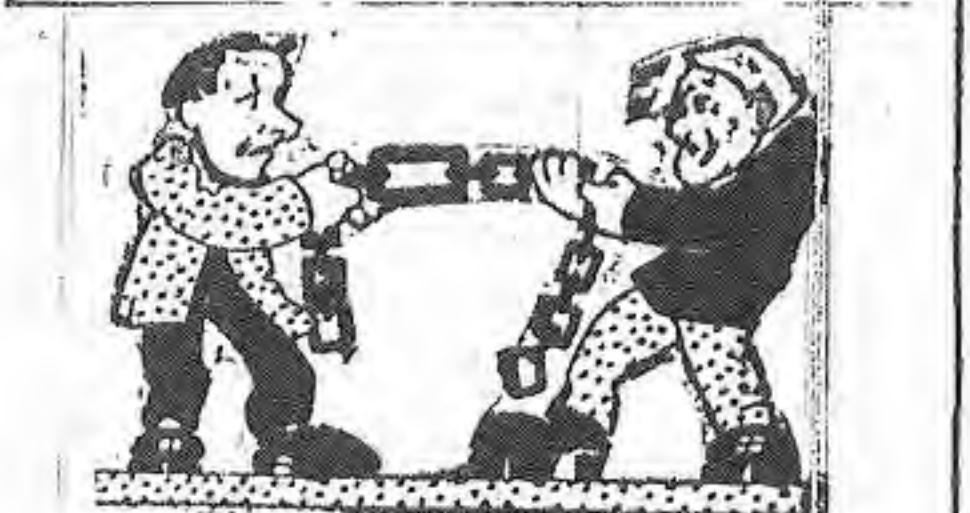

ST MUNCHIN'S NEW CATHOLIC CHURCH.

Laying Foundation Stone.

On Sunday the Catholic Bishop of Limerick, Most Rev Dr Hallinan, attended at St Munchin's with a number of clergy of the diocese, to lay the foundation stone of the new church for the parish. There was a large attendance, the parishioners naturally taking a special interest in the function, and the number of the general body of the citizens evincing their interest by being present at the ceremony. The latter included the Mayor, Mr. S. O'Mara, Captain Sir Francis Keating, Mr. E. Lloyd, members of the Corporation, Mr. D. Doyle, Miss Doyle, Mr. J. D. Doyle and Mrs. Doyle, Mr. E. Tracy, O.C., Rev. F. Leo, Rector, Redemptorists; Rev. S. J. Conolly, A.M., P. Colver, M.A., Aid G. Glancy, Miss Daly, and others. The ceremony began at one o'clock, and being an open air one was most fortunately favoured with fine weather all through the proceedings. Dr. Hallinan in full pontifical vestments presided at the appointed time, and his lordship was assisted by the clergy who served in the choir, singing the responses to the litany and prayers which were recited. The chorists included—Rev. M. Murphy, P.P., St. Patrick's; Rev. J. Thornhill, O.C.; Rev. F. Tracy, O.C.; Rev. F. Leo, Rector, Redemptorists; Rev. S. J. Conolly, A.M.; P. Colver, M.A.; Aid G. Glancy, M.S.S.R.; Rev. T. Hogan, O.C., President, St. Munchin's College; and Rev. W. Dwyane, A.M., St. Michael's. Rev. T. Hogan, O.C., St. John's, acted as Master of Ceremonies, and Very Rev. James O'Donnell, P.P., St. Munchin's, and his Curates, Rev. J. Maloney and Rev. J. Halpin, received the Bishop on behalf of the parish. The ceremony throughout was a simple, religious, and appealing one. It had, moreover, its secular side in the historic association of the site, the story of the old church, alongside which the new edifice is to be erected, and the glowing memory back to the numerous events, local and general, of which the building has been a mute witness. St. Munchin's Church, the records tell us, was the first erected in the city after the revolution, and the necessity for a new edifice has long been felt in the parish. On the 10th of the month, in his address to the people, referred to the steps taken for the erection of the new church of which he had just laid the foundation stone, how he put the worthy parish priest of St. Munchin's, Canon O'Donnell, in motion, and how that gentleman consulted with the parishioners, from whom he received the whole-hearted promise of co-operation and approval. It should be stated that the new church will be in the grounds, but a little more to the north side, on which the building it is to replace will stand in its original position. The building will be in the Romano-Gothic style of architecture, and will be a handsome structure, the walls being made of brick, and the roof of the nave and the several details of this structure will be in accordance with the style of the edifice. The building will be a cruciform. The architect is Mr. J. J. O'Malley, B.E., the builders Messrs. John Kery and Sons, and the clerk of works, Mr. J. McCormack. The ground which the Most Rev. Dr. Hallinan laid the foundation stone of was a gift of Mr. J. J. O'Malley, and was presented by the builders in a handsome morocco case, lined with silk and plush. It bore a suitable inscription commensurate of the occasion, while the stone also bore an inscription recording its placing in situ by Dr. Hallinan, and gave the names of Canon O'Donnell, the architect, and the builders. At the close of the ceremony with full Pontifical Mass, Most Rev. Dr. Hallinan addressed those present, and said it was to him a great pleasure and privilege as Bishop to officiate at so solemn a function, and so important a one—he might say too, so necessary a one, for they had only to look at the old church beside them, and existing over a century, to see that it was so. When strangers came to Limerick to see the famous Treaty Stone, and inquired about the little church opposite, who would not feel humiliated that such a church—that poor little church—should be the only edifice dedicated to the Titular Saint of the diocese of St. Munchin's? Was it not right then to build a new church, a grander one, to be a credit to the city, and to the name of St. Munchin's? He said that he was glad to see that the ground was now being cleared, and that the new church was to be built before now. Well, David wished to raise a temple to the Lord, but it remained to be erected by his son and successor. In the life of Cardinal Manning it was recorded that he desired to erect a diocesan cathedral, and that a successor of that prelate that gave Westminster Cathedral to English Catholics. So with their own church. Former parish priest of St. Munchin's, Doctor Molloy and Dr. Shanahan, were anxious to build a new church, but obstacles and difficulties stood in the way. The late Canon Murphy, had it in his mind to build a new church, but he died before he could do so. Now devoted to their worthy parish priest Canon O'Donnell. Last summer he mentioned the matter to Canon O'Donnell, the parishioners were spoken to, and they agreed to co-operate and support him in the erection of the new church. Now that the contract has been put into the hands of the contractor, and the ceremony of to-day over, his lordship was full of confidence that Canon O'Donnell might rely on the co-operation of his people, and those of the diocese in helping to erect this new church to the glory of God and the diocese. The proceedings then concluded.

LIMERICK QUARTER SESSIONS.

The Limerick Quarter Sessions will be opened on Friday next at 11 o'clock by his Honor County Court Judge Pigot. There is no Court business on the 12th, the day being a public holiday. The first case taken at the instance of Mr. A. Mackey, who was fined £25 by the magistrates recently for having a motor car without a permit. The civil side of the calendar is light, except for malicious injury claims. There are twenty-four such applications from the city, involving £7,412, and fifty-two from the county, involving a sum of £93,430. THEATRE ROYAL. There were large audiences at both houses in the Theatre Royal last night, when a delightful picture programme was presented. The principal attraction was the film entitled "Darby and Joan," adapted from one of Sir Hall Caine's works. The picture was a mixture of the sentimental incidents, and held the audience throughout. It was distinctly realistic, clever, and entertaining, and will be produced again to-night and to-morrow night, when it should ensure a wide measure of patronage. CITIZEN ATTACKED AND BEATEN. On Saturday night at half past nine, a violent and unprovoked attack was made on Mr. William Collier, while proceeding to his residence at No. 1 Crescent Avenue. Mr. Collier, when within a few yards from his house, was set upon by three men who assaulted him without any cause. He was struck on the head, and almost rendered unconscious. In the attack Mr. Collier, who is a quiet and inoffensive citizen, was deprived of his keys. When taken to his home the injured man was found to be dazed and suffering from loss of blood. Surgical aid was procured, and on Sunday and yesterday the patient had lapses of consciousness. At the place where Mr. Collier was attacked there is no public lamp, and the scandal of allowing the place to remain in darkness for more than twelve months has been over and over again commented upon. Opposite St. Joseph's Church the electric light standard, which was accidentally knocked down last July twelve months, has been replaced, but the lamp has not been affixed to it, with the result that the place is constantly in utter darkness at night. THE LATE MR JAMES BOURCHIER. A Sofia message received in Paris states that Mr. James Bouchier, late Correspondent of "The Times" in the Balkans, will be given a State funeral next week, when the delegates of all Bulgarian armaments have arranged to attend. According to his wish, his body will be buried in the eminent Monastery of St. Jean de Rilp, a town of the Bulgarian recesses. [Deceased was a distinguished Limerick man being fourth son of the late Mr. John Bouchier of Boggotown, in this county.]

THE PORT OF LIMERICK.

Application for Storage Accommodation. At the meeting of the Limerick Harbour Board on Saturday, a letter was read from the Cork Steamship Company stating they intended trading between Limerick, Cardiff, and Bristol, and asking the Board to be good enough to say what storage accommodation they could provide for their service. The secretary said at present they had no storage space available, the Moore-McCormack Company having recently got a ship in one of the sheds. Mr. W. Holliday, Chairman, pointed out that the sailing to the Bristol Channel ports would be a great advantage to the port. Mr. Ryan—The Limerick Steamship Company have, I understand, a service between Limerick, Bristol, and London. The secretary—Yes. Mr. J. P. Goodbody suggested, and it was agreed to, that the Secretary should do everything possible to facilitate the Cork Steamship Company.

THE BRUFF PRISONERS.

Charge of Unlawful Assembly. It was learned in Kilmallick yesterday that the 123 young men who were arrested in connection with the raid on Cahergallagher's House Bruff, will be tried by a military court for unlawful assembly. They are presently detained in Limerick County Jail. EXCITING INCIDENT IN THE CITY. An exciting incident occurred in Limerick on Saturday evening. A plain clothes policeman arrested a man, and while he was being taken to the barracks the prisoner broke away at the corner of the street. The policeman called upon him to stop and fire at him. The man ran into a shop, turned the fire, and ran into a back street, where he escaped. The fire caused great alarm and was investigated.

STOP PRESS NEWS

INDIAN LOCAL GOVERNMENT.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT TO FORMALLY OPEN PROVINCIAL COUNCILS. Delhi, Monday—Responsible Government under the Montagu-Chelmsford Scheme was constituted in all the provinces to-day. The Councils will be formally opened by the Duke of Connaught this month.

THE AMBUSH NEAR MIDDLETON.

New Measures Taken by the Military. Seven Houses Destroyed by Order. The following communication was issued by General Headquarters in Dublin on Sunday evening: As a result of an ambush of police on December 29th at Middleton, Co. Cork (a martial law area) in which one policeman was killed and eight wounded, two of whom have since died, the houses of seven inhabitants living in the vicinity, and who were bound to have known of the ambush, were destroyed yesterday by order of the Military Government. The occupants were given one hour's notice to remove their belongings. A message from Middleton states that the following houses were destroyed between 3 p.m. and 5 p.m. on January 1st: Mr. John O'Shea, Middleton; Mr. Patsy McCarthy, Middleton; Mr. Edward Carey, Middleton; Mr. Cotter, Ballyadan; Mr. Deane, Ballyadan; Mr. M'Dorgan, Knockgriffin, and Mr. Ahern, Knockgriffin. Previous to the burning notice was served on the persons affected giving them leave to clear their premises, but their furniture, foodstuffs, etc., or hay were destroyed.

MOTOR TAXES IN IRELAND

An Inequitable Impost. In the course of an interview yesterday with a representative of the Press, Mr. Edward White, President of the Royal Irish Automobile Club, expressed what he described as the injustice of the new tax to be levied on motor cars in Ireland. There were several reasons, he said, why in equity and justice Irish motorists should not pay the new motor tax. The first and the greatest reason was because of the restrictions placed by the Government upon the use of motor cars in this country. Another reason was the condition of the roads, which were worn down by Government traffic, and with regard to which there seemed no prospect of improvement. Matters in both these respects were quite different in Great Britain. In most parts of Ireland the roadmen were dismissed, or about to be dismissed; and from what the newspapers said, he and a motorist knew that there would be considerable difficulty and delay before any general scheme of road repair is taken in hand. And the third reason why in this country, as distinct from Great Britain, the tax should not be imposed, was that touring and driving cars for other than absolutely business was impossible. These points the Automobile Club, on behalf of all Ireland had been urging upon the Government as a reason why, until conditions in Ireland became normal, the tax which in more favoured countries have to pay should not be imposed upon this country.

FERMOY FINED £100

For Damaging Proclamations. Mr. Thomas O'Mahony, J.P., Chairman of Fermoys Urban Council, and J. J. Broderick, D.D., wrote, a Fermoys correspondent, both taken to the military barracks, Fermoys, on Sunday morning. They were informed that the town had been fined £100 in connection with the tearing down of the proclamations which had been posted during the week at the Post Office and certain shop windows. It appears that either gentleman was given the option of remaining under arrest until the fine was paid. Mr. O'Mahony decided that as he was Chairman of the Council he would remain. Mr. Broderick demurred on account of his colleague's health. Mr. O'Mahony was subsequently visited by his medical adviser, Dr. Magner, and in the evening he was taken to the Military Hospital, where he now is.

TWO MEN SHOT

At Ballylanders. A report issued yesterday from Dublin Castle states that on Saturday last David Tobin and Thomas Murphy, two men who were wanted by the authorities on serious military charges, were shot at Ballylanders, in the Bruff district of County Limerick, on Sunday. When Tobin had run about one hundred yards he took shelter behind a bank, with a revolver in his hand. He was outflanked and shot dead. Murphy, who continued to run and refused to halt, was fired at and wounded, and died later.

THE BISHOP OF ROSS AND CAIME.

Preaching at First Mass in Skibberene on Sunday morning, the Most Rev. Dr. Kelly, Roman Catholic Bishop of Ross, said that the lessons to be learned from the Circumcision of Our Lord were obedience and suffering. Dr. Kelly said that he would be very glad if he could promise the young men of the New Year's morning a year of prosperity and cheerfulness, but he could not promise them happiness if they had good conduct and observed God's Law. If they did that they would have a good conscience, and if they found that they stood well with Almighty God they would be happy, no matter what trouble might be going on around them. Their Catechism told them that no motive however good, could excuse a sin, and it followed that no motive however good, could excuse a sin. If they committed an offence, they could not have good conscience. Let them keep their conscience clear, and if they did, the year 1921 would be a happy year for them, and they would have progressed in the great work of the salvation of their souls and come one year nearer to the happiness of Heaven.

ENNIS PETTY SESSIONS.

There was a Petty Sessions Court at Ennis on Friday for the first time for two months. Major R. Johnson, V.C., the newly appointed R.M., presided alone. A STUDENT'S DEATH AT LISTOWEL. A Listowel correspondent states that John Lator, an educational student, died there on Saturday from concussion of the brain, the result of an alleged fall from a window in the town on the previous night. LATEST NEWS.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

(Special to the "Chronicle.") RESULT OF TRADE DEPRESSION. Notice to Colliers. Nearly 4000 Hands Affected. Owing to trade depression, the colliers at Duffryn Amman Colliery, Amman Valley, have been given fourteen days' notice to terminate their contracts. The whole of the seven pits of the main collieries at Neath are idle to-day through a similar cause. Nearly four thousand colliers are affected.

UNEMPLOYED RAID AT ISLINGTON.

Police Resist Attack. Thirteen Injured. Nineteen men arrested by the police during yesterday's raid by a section of the unemployed on Islington Town Hall were brought up at Clerkenwell to-day. It is stated the police had to use their truncheons to resist the attack, and that thirteen constables were injured. Several men were bound over. Fines and imprisonment up to six weeks were imposed on others. Five were released.

ALLIES AND GERMANY.

Foch's Report to be Considered by Premiers. A conference of the Allied Premiers will be held in Paris towards the close of this month when Marshal Foch's report on German disarmament will be fully considered. The attitude of the Allies towards Germany will be decided upon.

FIUME CASUALTIES.

Rome, Monday (Semi-Off. It.). Between December 23 and the signing of the Fiume agreement the regular forces lost seventeen dead, and 120 wounded. Irregulars, 18 dead and 50 wounded, and the civil population 20 dead and about ten wounded.

PROVISIONAL GOVERNOR ELECTED.

Rome, Monday—The Communal Council of Fiume has elected M. Grossi as Provisional Governor of Fiume, and has ratified the Abbiada Convention.

DESPAIR AT BUDAPEST.

Eleven Suicides. Vienna, Monday. Eleven persons committed suicide in Budapest on New Year's Eve. The motive is assigned to despair at the present conditions.

WRECK OF SPANISH SHIP.

Madrid, Tuesday—It is officially stated that fifty-six men so far have been rescued from the Santa Isabel.

M.C.C. AUSTRALIAN TOUR.

Melbourne, Tuesday—England out, 157; Australia won by an innings and 91.

QUEEN DOWAGER OF HOLLAND ILL.

Hague, Tuesday—Queen Dowager Emma, who is suffering from hernia will shortly undergo operative treatment.

CABINET FINANCE COMMITTEE.

The Cabinet Finance Committee to-day discussed their final estimates.

FLOODS IN WALES.

During the floods traffic on the Rhondda and Swansea Bay Railway was to-day held up.

SIR ERNEST CABLE'S NEW TITLE.

Sir Ernest Cable has decided to adopt the title of Baron Cable of Ireland, in the County of Devon.

LIMERICK MARKETS TO RE-OPEN.

We have been informed that the Chief Commanding the troops in Limerick has given permission for the re-opening of the Limerick markets. It will be recalled that the markets were prohibited by order of the Competent Military Authority on the 4th December in consequence of the firing at a military touring car in O'Connell Avenue on the morning of the 30th November.

ARMS AND AMMUNITION DISCOVERED IN COUNTY.

Two Arrests. A party of police and military, under Sergeant Horan, proceeded from Limerick this morning to Garra and Holy Cross, in the Bruff district, and in a disused limekiln near Holy Cross they discovered a number of rifles, shotguns, and ammunition. The seizure embraced twenty rifles and shotguns, and about a thousand rounds of ammunition, all of which were taken to Williamstreet Police Barracks. Two arrests have been made in connection with the affair.

THE BALLYBROOD FATAL SHOOTING CASE.

The reported arrest of three persons in connection with the fatal shooting, on Thursday night or in the small hours of Friday morning, at Ballybrood, of Richard Leonard, school attendance officer to Limerick No. 1 District Council, and the subsequent release of two of those taken into custody by the constabulary, has been confirmed. The authorities continue engaged inquiring into the facts of the case, which will not be proceeded with against the prisoner, for some days to come. A report from Caherounish this evening states that the body of the deceased, Richard Leonard, is to be exhumed, by order of the authorities.

CHARGE AGAINST A CLERGYMAN.

Two Years' Imprisonment. A Waterford Correspondent states that as the result of a court-martial, held in Waterford on the 18th December, the Rev. P. H. Delahanty, O.C. Cahlan, Co. Kilkenny, has been sentenced to two years' imprisonment with hard labour. There were five charges against the accused, all in respect of the possession of medicinal literature, and he was found guilty on all charges. Father Delahanty was removed from Waterford on board a Government transport, and conveyed to England.

DEATH OF LT.-COL. STANDISH O'GRADY.
