TELEPHONE CHARGES.

On top of increased postal and telegraph rates which have lately come into operation, is the prospect of advances in the telephone tariff. This is by no means welcome intelligence for the public, especially the business portion of it, which relies on the phone so much for the conduct of its daily affairs.

THE BALLYBROOD SHOOTING

The man detained in connection with the fatal shooting of Mr. Richard Leonard, school attendance officer, at Ballybrood last Friday morning, is described as a machine gun corps officer, aged 30, an Englishman, with ten years' service. Three arrests had been made, of which two were released.

BOMB THROWN IN CORK.

A Press Association message says:—A bomb was thrown at police crossing the Parrell Bridge, Cork, at 7.30 o'clock on Tuesday evening, and six persons were wounded.

SIX POLICEMEN AND SEVERAL CIVILIANS INJURED.

The incident occurred near the chief police headquarters in the city, and the men there turned out with rifles and machine guns. There are stated to have been used on the quays and neighbouring streets, with the result that several persons were wounded.

AUBUSH NEAR NEWMARKET.

Four Houses Destroyed by Order. An official military report states that two motor cars containing five soldiers and one policeman, were ambushed on Tuesday afternoon near Newmarket, County Cork, in a large field.

MYSTERIOUS SHOOTING AFFAIR IN CORK.

A tragedy which is surrounded with mystery occurred in Cork in the early hours of Wednesday morning, and as a result of it a gentleman, who had registered at the Imperial Hotel as Father Darcy, has lost his life.

DEATH OF MR WILLIAM WESTROPP STAMERS.

Mr William Westropp Stammers died at his residence, 4, Jewell terrace, Sunday, 4th inst., at 11.30 a.m., aged 70 years.

DEATH OF MR W. COLLIER.

We regret to state that Mr William Collier, who, as already reported, was attacked on Saturday night by three men near his home at Crossen Avenue, and violently assaulted, succumbed to his injuries yesterday.

DEATH OF SERGEANT CORBY.

The death took place this morning, in the Military Hospital, New Barracks, Limerick, of Sergeant M. Corby, a member of the city police force.

IRELAND'S CONTRIBUTION TO BRITISH REVENUE.

The demolition of the old Erie and Gater at Richmond is nearly completed, and work has been made in building the new one, which is expected to be completed in three years.

Mr Colby, the United States Secretary of State, who is making official visits to South American countries, has been entertained at Montevideo at a banquet given by the President of Uruguay.

According to a wireless message from Prague, the Czechoslovak authorities have advised the Stambolski, the Bulgarian Prime Minister, to settle his differences with the Yugoslavs at Belgrade.

It is rumored that Polkair station in Norfolk, where two 2-pennies are being overhauled, will be handed over to a commercial undertaking after the Government have used it for six months for experiments.

A masked man with a revolver held up a woman banking clerk at Goring, while the porter Worthing, Essex, and another while the porter was having supper, and escaped with £7.

A Morley's Tyndal message states that owing to the depression in the steel trade 500 out of the 6,000 men employed at Messrs Goss, Keeson, and Nettleton's, Ltd., Downhills Lane Works received a month's notice.

Alfred and Louisa Dale, 69 and 70 respectively, have celebrated their golden wedding in Bradford, Yorkshire, of which they have been married for 8 years. They were married with extra care to mark the happy occasion.

For the construction of a boulevard to connect Northgate with the neighboring village of Boston, Sir Jesse Bayly has been appointed. The boulevard will be 2 miles long and 100 feet wide. Including this work, the Government has promised £400,000 over the next five years during the past twelve months.

MARTIAL LAW EXTENDED. Clare, Waterford, Wexford and Kilkenny.

The Lord Lieutenant, Viscount French, issued on Tuesday night the following proclamation, extending Martial Law in Ireland to the counties of Clare, Waterford, City of Wexford, Wexford, and Kilkenny...

"Whereas, by proclamation given at his Majesty's Castle of Dublin on the 10th day of December, 1920, I, John Denton Pinkerton Viscount French, Lord Lieutenant, General and Governor of Ireland, did proclaim that certain counties are, and until further order, shall continue to be under and subject to Martial Law...

"Given at His Majesty's Castle of Dublin, this 4th day of January, 1921." "FRENCH." A second proclamation by General Macready, in similar terms to that issued in the area previously brought under martial law, fixes the 11th night as the time limit for the surrender of arms, ammunition, and explosives...

Surrender of Uniforms.

The following is forwarded for publication: "NOTICE." In amplification of the previous Order referring to the surrender of uniforms, which appeared in this paper on the 28th and 30th December and last instant, the following is issued as a guide...

THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS.

In view of the fact that January 10th next will be the first birthday of the League of Nations, the League of Nations Union is organising through the 400 branches, a large number of public meetings, when addresses will be delivered upon the significance of the League during the past year...

NO ORDERS FOR NEW SHIPS.

Bad Outlook for Construction. Messrs. Turner, Davidson, and Co., Ltd., in a review of the shipping position, write: "The value of steamers has undergone an extraordinary change since the beginning of 1920. There was nothing uncommon in a price of £40 to £50 per ton for new steamers of 4,000 to 5,000 tons capacity..."

UNEMPLOYMENT IN FRANCE.

The Paris correspondent of "The Times" says: "The efforts to cope with the unemployment problem in France are being watched here with acute interest, for the pressing reason that the growing number of unemployed in France is daily making Ministers, officials, and manufacturers realise more sharply the difficulties which they will shortly be involved. There has been an 'unemployment crisis' ever since the armistice, but it has become acute, and its consequences have not become dangerous. It is, however, one of the unemployed dangers to grow and that seems inevitable..."

AUSTRALIAN WHEAT AND WOOL.

The expectation of a heavy crop of Australian wheat has given rise to some anxiety in the Commonwealth as to the shipping space for exports. Though the facilities for shipping are considerable, the great weight of grain in recent years owing to the shortage of supplies at the docks is fresh in the minds of Australian merchants and producers. It is estimated that the wheat available for export this season will amount to between 120,000,000 and 130,000,000 bushels. In addition, the wool clip is expected to yield nearly two million bales, and there is still a considerable portion of last season's clip awaiting shipment. More than usual quantities of new, reliable, but not too expensive, are expected to be available for export this season. Special arrangements are being made on the New South Wales railways to handle the wheat crop of that State, which is estimated at 4,000,000 bushels. Despite the heavy yield, the Australian Government has decided to continue the policy of a bushel, half of which will be payable on delivery at the railway sidings, and the remainder at a later date.

FALLING PRICES.

The prices of several commodities in general are becoming easier. The price of wheat and flour is considerably lower and is still falling. The 4th lot will probably be sold cheaper before January ends. There are expectations that another lot will soon be taken off the price of sugar, and that the 10th October lot will be protracted for some time. Dried fruits, however, are in demand for them, but they are also cheaper. But more noteworthy and encouraging is the slump that has taken place in the price of clothing, even in footwear. This downward reaction in prices is also observable in other directions. The prospect will doubtless be slow, but it is encouraging to find movement, however slow, in the right direction.

DESTRUCTION OF TRIM TOWN HALL.

County Court Judge Fleming has awarded the Trim Council a total sum of £2,800 for the complete destruction by fire of the Town Hall and its furniture.

Er-service men's associations in Whitehall have called a mass meeting to protest against the extension of higher-paid women and non-service men and disperse other grievances.

PEEPS INTO THE PAST

The following are extracts from the Limerick Chronicle of April, 1821: "Wednesday, April 4. 'STILL SEIZURE FRACAS.' On Saturday, the 24th ult., Philip Staakpool, Reg. Preventive Surveyor accompanied by his brother-in-law, Thomas and Grace Johnson, Kepp, and a servant boy, seized a private distillery which was working on the lands of Glanmurry near Kilmurry, in the County of Clare, but before they could move the seizure they were surrounded by upwards of one hundred persons, armed with pitchforks, the seizure renewed, and the party with difficulty were put with their lives, after receiving some blows and severe bruising. Saturday, April 7. FROM AMERICA.

By the Bell, from New York, which arrived in our harbour yesterday with faxed cables, we have been favoured with American papers to the 9th March, from which we have made some extracts. The Bell was driven into Milltown Malbay, and was beating about on that coast for a day and a night during the late gale.

MEDICAL CLASS MEETING.
