LIMERICK QUARTER SESSIONS

Malignant Injury Claims

His Honor County Court Judge Pigot, resumed the business of Limerick Quarter Sessions on Monday with the hearing of malignant injury claims.

Lieutenant Vernon Watling, R.A.F., applied for £2,000 compensation for injuries received at Grange, Co. Limerick, on the 8th November last.

Mr. J. Gaffney, Crown Solicitor, appeared for the applicant, and asked that the case be taken out of the calendar of the Crown Court at Grange, on the 8th November. The case was after passing through the usual process, and the applicant was awarded the sum of £2,000.

The applicant, in his evidence, stated that he was a member of a convoy from Fermoy to the barracks at Grange, on the 8th November. At half-past one or two o'clock in the afternoon they arrived at Grange, where they were ambushed, and he was injured.

His Honor—Did any of the lorries reply to the fire?—Yes.

His Honor—What age are you?—Thirty-one years.

By Mr. Gaffney—He was married, and his pay was 23s a day.

His Honor—Is it suggested that he is incapable of doing further duty?—No.

Mr. Gaffney—No.

Captain M. Shippey, R.A.M.C., New Barracks, deposed to examining the applicant on the evening of the 8th November at 4 o'clock. He was then unconscious, and had a bullet wound in the forehead.

He was removed to Cork on the 9th November, where some fragments of bone were removed. Witness examined the applicant that morning, and although he was considerably improved, he suffered from headache as a result of the weakening of the brain.

Replying to the Court, the applicant said the troops in Ireland were now on active service, but were not so engaged on the 8th November last, and that he had been unable to obtain active service.

His Honor reserved judgment.

Coronel O'Herlihy, shopkeeper, Kilmallock, claimed £2,833 4s 6d compensation for the destruction by fire of his shop goods and furniture on the 26th July last, and loss of business.

Messrs M. Conyn, K.C., and M. Binchy (instructed by Mr. R. Fox, solicitor) appeared for the applicant.

Counsel stated that the application was before the Court at the October Quarter Sessions. The house was opposite Kilmallock police station, which was, as his Honor was aware, destroyed some time previous. The evidence had already been given, except in the case of the applicant, who was unable to attend last time, and the application was consequently adjourned.

O'Herlihy was now in court to give evidence of the value of the shop goods destroyed.

The applicant was examined, and submitted evidence detailing the goods and fixtures lost on the occasion and their present value.

His Honor allowed £2,000 compensation.

CONSTABLE'S DEATH

Henry L. Nathan, St. Alban's, applied for £3,000 compensation for the loss of his son, Constable Cyril H. Nathan, R.I.C., who was shot dead in Edward street, Limerick, on the 15th August.

Mr. Gaffney, Crown Solicitor, for applicant, said the claim arose out of the disturbances that took place in the city on Sunday, the 15th August. On that occasion the constable was shot dead and his father now applied for compensation for his loss.

The applicant, in the course of his evidence, stated he was engaged in furniture dealing in St. Alban's. He received intimation by wire of the death of his son on the 15th August. He had five sons, and the deceased was the only one that escaped uninjured from the war. The deceased, who took over the business, contributed to his mother's support after joining the Royal Irish Constabulary.

Constable Beamish deposed to seeing the constable fall after being shot and subsequently taken to hospital.

District Inspector Grealy stated that Nathan's pay and allowances amounted to £222 15s per annum. He had a wife and two children, and was being under twelve months he was only entitled to the lowest grade of pay. After his death the Chief Secretary wired his sympathy, and added that being an energetic man his loss to the force was very great.

Colonel Woodside, R.A.M.C., stated that Nathan was dead when he arrived at the hospital. He had a bullet wound in the neck, and died from shock.

His Honor reserved judgment.

Captain Lindsey applied for £2,000 compensation for the burning and destruction of Kilmallock police station, and the loss of his son, Constable Cyril H. Nathan, R.I.C., who was shot dead in Edward street, Limerick, on the 15th August.

Messrs M. Conyn, K.C., and M. Binchy (instructed by Mr. R. Fox, solicitor) appeared for the applicant, who case was that he held the premises under a lease dated 1867, rent free. The premises were used for the purpose of a police station, and were destroyed by fire on the 26th July last.

Messrs M. Conyn, K.C., and J. Conyn (instructed by Mr. J. Power, solicitor) appeared for the applicant.

In his evidence the applicant stated that he carried on business as fruiterer and general merchant at 11, 12 and 13, Cross street, Limerick, on the night of the 26th July his premises were completely burned down by twelve uniformed men, and destroyed.

Mr. Conyn—Was everything in the house destroyed?—Yes.

MILITARY TOURING CAR AMBUSHED IN DUBLIN

Lady's Narrow Escape

An official report issued from Dublin Castle states that at ten o'clock yesterday morning a military touring car was ambushed in Dublin.

When the car was approaching Clarendon Bridge eight men opened fire from both sides at the car. The driver was slightly wounded, and the car was riddled with bullets.

The car, in which were the driver and an officer in front, and another officer with a lady behind, was passing near Clarendon Bridge, which crosses the canal, when a shot was fired from the right-hand side of the road and at the rear of the car.

The occupants thought at first that it was a tyre that had burst. The driver slowed down and looked out. Immediately there were two more shots fired from the same direction. They passed through the car from the back, breaking the wind screen.

The driver bobbed the driver, realising what was happening, told the driver to get on as fast as he could. The car had narrowly escaped the crown of the bridge, when two men, who were on the left-hand side of the road, opened fire with revolvers at a distance of a few feet. The man on the right-hand side leaped on to the footboard of the car, holding on to the door.

Further along the road another party pushed out a tradesman's horse and cart from a side street, and blocked the passage of the oncoming motor car. As soon as the man with the cart was out of the line of fire a fusillade of bullets from all quarters was fired after the motor. With great coolness the driver managed to get round the obstruction with only a slight collision, the motor evidently striking the corner of the cart. One officer was wounded. The car was driven at top speed to the city. It was splattered with bullets, particularly near the petrol tank.

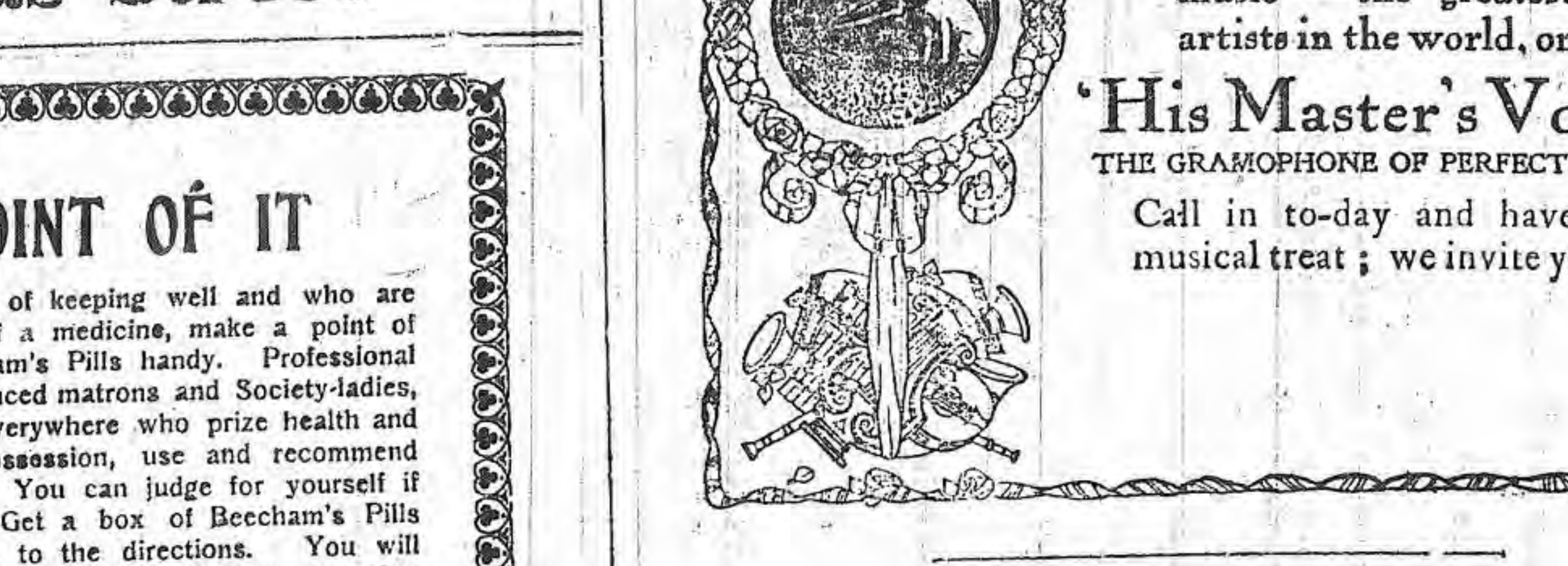
