THE COST OF LIVING.

It is a matter of no ordinary satisfaction to observe that the limit to soaring food prices, as well as the cost of other commodities, has apparently now been reached, and that a downward tendency has at last set in.

WILD SCENES IN CORK.

Excise Officer Shot Dead. There were wild scenes in Cork last Saturday, and unfortunately it culminated in the death of one civilian, the wounding of a police sergeant and a constable and civilians.

A little after four o'clock shots were fired in the air with the object of dispersing persons who had assembled, contrary to the terms of the Proclamation, in Washington street, Sergeant John Mallin, and Constable Regan, Intelligence Department, were fired at and the former seriously wounded in the abdomen, and the latter was wounded in several places in the body.

THE CORK DEATH SENTENCE.

Arguments in Court Adjourned. In the King's Bench Division yesterday, the application for a writ of certiorari to quash the proceedings at the Court-martial in Cork which tried Joseph Murphy and sentenced him to death, was adjourned until Monday, 24th, and the Court made an order further respiting the execution until Wednesday, the 26th inst.

ATTACKS ON CROWN FORCES IN CORK.

General Strickland's Warning. General Strickland has sent a letter to the Deputy Lord Mayor of Cork, in the course of which he says: "The present state of affairs in the city cannot be allowed to continue, and, severe as they may be, I shall feel compelled to take such drastic measures as may seem necessary to make the lives of the Crown forces secure from cowardly attacks by assassins in the streets."

ATTACK ON CORK POLICE BARRACKS.

About four o'clock yesterday morning the alarm was given of an attack on Tuckey Street Barracks, Cork. Reinforcements, including military, came from various parts of the city. There was heavy firing in the streets for some hours, but there were no casualties or arrests.

MUNSTER AND LEINSTER BANK.

Expanding Prosperity. The balance sheet of the Munster and Leinster Bank for the half-year ending 31st December last which we publish this evening, affords striking evidence of the continued prosperity of the institution, and the marked development of the bank's business during the past twelve months.

NEWCASTLE WEST QUARTER SESSIONS.

At 11 o'clock yesterday morning, His Honor County Court Judge Pigot opened the business of Newcastle West Quarter Sessions.

LIMERICK POSTAL TELEGRAPH OFFICIAL PROMOTED.

Mr. P. Nash, who for the past thirty years was connected with the Limerick Postal Telegraphs, has been promoted to the Postmastership of Boyle, a post office for the County Roscommon and district.

OUT AND ABOUT.

The Earl of Dunraven will arrive in London to-day from Adare, Co. Limerick, accompanied by Capt W. A. Redmond, D.S.O., M.P., Mr. G. de, who relinquished his commission and retains his rank.

LIMERICK HARBOUR BOARD.

Mr. L. Morley presided at the meeting of the Limerick Harbour Commissioners yesterday. There were also present—Messrs J. H. Roche, G. E. Ryan, Ald. P. Walsh, P. O'Connell, D.L., and G. E. Ryan.

STREET ACCIDENT.

This afternoon a collision occurred at the Roche's street corner of O'Connell street, and a countryman in charge of a lorry from the County of Clare was seriously injured.

AUDIT OF ACCOUNTS.

ORDERS AGAINST MORE PUBLIC BODIES. In the King's Bench Division yesterday, before the Lord Chief Justice, Mr. Justice Dalrymple, and Mr. Justice M. G. O'Connell.

CANADIAN EMBARGO TO REMAIN.

There is to be no raising of the embargo upon the importation of Canadian cattle into Great Britain—for the present at any rate.

BIG DISCOVERY OF ARMS IN FERMOY AND GLANWORTH.

Dublin, Monday.—Dublin Castle reports to-day that there have been recently big discoveries of arms in secret warehouses in Fermoy and Glanworth, Co. Cork.

It is reported that yesterday a party of police in a motor lorry proceeding from Kinsale, where one of their number had a leg wound, were ambushed and fired at by a party of men.

POLICEMAN SHOT DEAD IN CAPPAPWHITE.

A report from Cappawhite (Co. Tipperary) states that Constable Boyd, while in a public-house in that village last night, was attacked by armed men and shot dead. No arrests have so far been made.

FALL IN THE PRICE OF EGGS.

Eggs, which a week previously had fetched 5d each, were sold at the Galway market on Saturday at 3d, having fallen from 5s per score to 4s 3d and 4s 6d.

NEWCASTLE-WEST QUARTER SESSIONS.

At Newcastle West Quarter Sessions, held in Limerick, to-day, Patrick W. Hartnett, Mount Collins, was allowed £300 compensation for the destruction of a house on the 9th October.

STOP PRESS NEWS.

AMBUSH IN CLARE. Two Raiders Believed Killed or Wounded. A Press Association telegram says—In an ambush of a police car to-day at Clonlough, Co. Clare, it is believed two raiders were killed or wounded. No police casualties.

USA ARMY.

Washington, Monday. The Senate to-day voted a resolution fixing the strength of the army at 175,000 men.

PRESIDENT HARDING.

And International Disputes. The "New York Times" correspondent states that President Harding will invite the Powers to discuss the restriction of armaments, and the establishment of an International Tribunal for the settlement of disputes between nations.

LONG TIME CREDITS.

Colonel Chester Harding, at a meeting, declared that long time credits in European securities were necessary to the rehabilitation of foreign countries.
