RAILWAY BRIDGES BLOWN UP IN WEST CORK.

Services Dislocated. At least three bridges, and it is reported, others also, were blown up in West Cork districts, and as a consequence the train services on the Cork, Bandon, and South Coast Railway are considerably dislocated. A bridge, which carries the road over the railway track between Durrus Road station and Bantry, was one of those destroyed, and as the line is blocked by fallen masonry, there was yesterday no railway communication with Bantry...

Fortunate Escape of a Train.

The 8.25 train from Clonsilla to Cork had a remarkable escape from destruction. Anticipating no trouble, she was travelling at full speed, when about a mile from Ballincarrig she ran into a pile of logs, on the line, fortunately scattering them in all directions, but sustaining marks of the impact both on the front and beneath the engine. The train stopped, and it was found that the bridge had been demolished during the night. Two other bridges were also found destroyed along the route...

Another Account.

Another account of the terrible tragedy at Upton was kindly supplied by a gentleman who travelled in the incoming train from Bandon to Cork. He said:—The 9.30 train from Cork was ambushed at Upton station. There was a party of about 14 military on board, and the attacking party numbered about 50. The train carried a large number of civilian passengers. As the train was slowing into the station fire was opened upon it. The soldiers jumped out of the carriages and opened fire, the exchange of firing lasting about 20 minutes. The attacking party were then driven off. Eighty civilians, including one woman, were killed. Six of the eight were passengers on the train, and included two well-known commercial travellers, Mr John Spier, Clarence Terrace, St Luke's, Cork, who represented Messrs Warden and Co. merchants, Dublin; and Mr J J Byrne, of Criffland and Ross, Bristol...

ME DE VALERA.

Letter to Coalition Members. It is stated that a letter, signed "Kannon de Valera," has been sent to every member of the Coalition Party, calling attention to the responsibility of the Coalition Party for the present position of the Crown Forces in Ireland. The letter says that the troops are waging an unjust war on the Irish people, and are behaving in a manner contrary to the rules of war. It alleges that the Crown forces are guilty of murders, arson, and other outrages. The Irish people the letter states, are engaged in a lawful fight for a sacred right, it protests against making the possession of firearms an offence, and says that prisoners are often shot without just cause, while orders have been issued that hostages carried in lorries are to be shot if the units with which they are engaged are unable to attack the lorries. The letter concludes, are done with the will of Coalition members of Parliament.

PREHISTORIC MONSTERS IN CANADA.

New types of prehistoric monsters have been traced together from fossil remains found in Alberta, on the banks of the Red Deer River. Some of the discoveries made by the excavators from the New York Museum are described in a Bulletin of the American Geographical Society. One species of herb-eater, a Trachodon, was more than thirty feet long and fifteen feet high when standing erect. Its head, with broadly expanded snout, resembled that of a duck, but behind the beak there were more than 2,000 small teeth. The long legs terminated in three large hoofed toes, and the shorter, slender front feet were partly webbed. A long, slim tail acted as a powerful swimming organ. Having no means of defence, the beast lived chiefly in the water. Another large creature, believed to have been a fish-eating dinosaur, had many of the characteristics of a bird, including toothless, beak-like jaws.

Hallinan, president of the local branch of the G. O. P., the remains were taken to the place from St Michael's Catholic Church. There was a large and representative attendance of the general public, and the firm of Messrs John Q. and Co., of which the deceased gentleman was for many years a director, was closed as a mark of respect.

THE MAIL SERVICES.

At Cork Harbour Board yesterday, the resolution of the Limerick Harbour Board asking the Government to appoint a Commission to inquire into the inefficient English mail service to and from Ireland, was read and agreed to. Mr S. H. Maguire, on promotion by the Department, was brought up at the Chamber of Commerce, and the Irish mail travelled at a very fast rate from Cork to Holyhead, and the mail had also been accelerated by sea, but the delay was due to the train backing into Kingsbridge, instead of starting from Annis-street.
