PIERCED BATTLE IN CO. CORK

Many Soldiers and Civilians Killed

General Headquarters, Dublin, issued the following on Saturday evening:—About 8 a.m. today, a party of the Essex Regiment, Hampshire Regiment, and R.I.C. were operating on Co. Cork...

A fierce resistance was put up by the small party in charge of the transport, but before the main body could come to their rescue three other ranks R.A.S.C. and three other ranks of the Essex Regiment, and one R.I.C. driver were killed, and the transport burned.

For the arrival of the main body, and reinforcements of police and Auxiliaries, who vigorously engaged them, the rebels fled, leaving six of their dead. Seven women were carried away by their comrades. Six wounded rebels were captured by the Crown forces.

A Bandon Correspondent writes:—As the result of the ambush at Crosskerry on Saturday morning, it is now known that six soldiers, including Sergeant Watts, and one policeman, Constable Kenward, were killed. Lieutenant Holtback, another officer, and three privates, all belonging to the Essex Regiment, and Constable Kenzie, R.I.C. were wounded.

Early in the morning lorries went from Bandon towards Crosskerry and dropped a number of soldiers in the vicinity. Later another party of military went from Bandon to Crosskerry, and were ambushed at that place. Constable Kenward, the driver of one lorry, was shot dead immediately, his head being almost blown off.

Creable Kenzie, another driver, was wounded seriously. A lorry was ambushed while it was in progress of the original party of soldiers endeavoured to encircle the strikers. One of the attacking party was shot dead, it is said, just as he blew up a road mine. The battle lasted for about three hours. Three lorries were burned, and a quantity of arms and ammunition, it is said, taken by the attackers.

The dead belonging to the Crown forces were brought to Bandon Military Barracks, as well as four dead civilians, who are said to have belonged to the attacking party.

BATTLE NEAR DUNGARVAN

Two Police and Several Civilians Dead

It has been learned unofficially that two lorries with Crown forces left Dungarvan after midnight on Saturday, and effected an arrest near 11.30 p.m. on Sunday. They were fired upon by a party of about 200 men, who returned the fire, and got through with their prisoners, but with a military officer and a police sergeant missing.

A relief party proceeded to the scene, and found the military officer. They were again fired on, and a motor driver was dangerously wounded in the head. He died soon afterwards. One dead body of the attacker was also recovered, and others dead were observed. Arms, ammunition, and bombs were seized.

The dead body of the missing sergeant was found about a mile from Dungarvan. He had been blindfolded, and a card with the word "Executed" written on it was found pinned to his body. The body bore the marks of several bullets.

Other Tragic Week-End Happenings

A party of police was attacked at Castletownrout, Co. Wick, on Saturday night. Constable Kenzie was seriously wounded, and Constable Crowley was wounded.

At Fermoy, two soldiers and a girl were fired at and wounded while on some roundabouts. All are in hospital. Curlew was put into force at 7 o'clock on Saturday evening.

Shortly before Curlew hours in Cork on Saturday night, (Thomas) Heenan, a 34-year-old man of the Cork Lunatic Asylum, was shot dead by a party of disguised men. Some time ago he was wounded while speaking to a constable, and received a compensation award.

On Saturday night in Cork, before Curlew hours, Mr. Thomas Mahony, Grand View Terrace, Curlew Road, and a Jersey named Healy, received bullet wounds, and lay in the South Infirmary. A young labourer named Thomas Murphy is in the Mercy Hospital, having been seriously wounded by the shot with a knife.

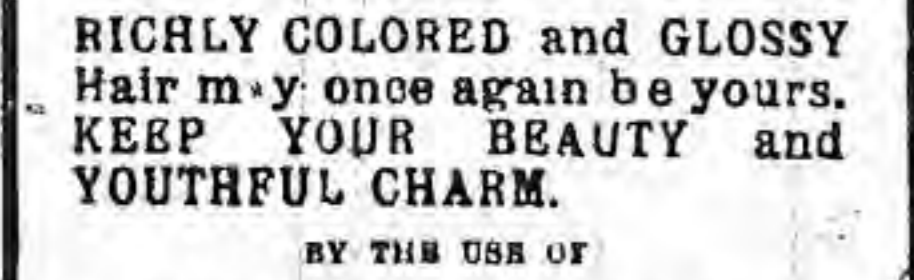
About three o'clock on Sunday a party of police were ambushed near Roscommon, about five miles from Cork. Two constables were wounded. Some shots were made, and six received a bullet wound while cycling near Douglas, and a blacksmith named O'Hara received similar injuries at Passage. Both are in the South Infirmary, and are not at present serious cases.

Shortly after 9 o'clock on Sunday night, James Mullane, Paul's Avenue, Cork, was shot dead by a Curlew patrol. He did not halt when challenged, and a shot was fired in his direction.

On Saturday night bombs were thrown at a lorry in Aughran-street, Dublin. One bomb exploded in the lorry, and two of the occupants were killed and one hurt. In subsequent shooting several civilians were injured.

The annual meeting of the Limerick Protestant Aid Society.

The annual meeting of the Limerick Protestant Aid Society was held on Friday, March 18th, at the Home, Ryves' Path. Mr. A. Murray presided. There were present—Mrs. Goodwin, Mrs. Bakin, Mr. C. W. M. Mr. Fitz read the annual report as follows:—"The Committee desire once more to return thanks to Almighty God for His blessing bestowed on the work of the Society during another year. Quietly unobtrusively that work is being carried on, so quietly that there is apparently the danger of its being unobserved by many of the Protestants of Limerick. That this is so, is evident from the fact that our income falls very far short of our expenditure, and we cannot believe that the people are ungrateful, or generous in support of every good cause, would allow this work to suffer for lack of funds if they knew and remembered its existence.

"The activities of the Society extend in three directions, the first and most prominent is the maintenance of our Home, in which are supported in comfort and cleanliness old people (men and women) at present numbering 12, who lack the means to support themselves or their friends to provide them. The Home is under the superintendence of a trained nurse (Mrs. K. Harding), to whom once again the Committee place on record their thanks for her constant attention to all the details of the Home.

"The third method which the Society employs in buying and distributing of coal, (Warath is said to be known and its status to the aged, and the cost of obtaining it in the winter months is too well known in these days to need explanation. We have thus briefly stated the work in which the Protestant Aid Society is, and has been for so many years, engaged, and we are convinced that it is only necessary for the cause to be known, and its status to be recognized, and the money necessary for the successful prosecution of the work will be forthcoming.

"The Committee desire again to thank Mrs. Harding for her usual kindness in making a collection of 233.

"The Committee desire to place on record their deep regret at the death of Miss Mary who for many years was a very sincere friend and supporter of the Society.

"The Committee cannot conclude its report without expressing its great regret at the departure of Mr. Thomas Grubb from the city. He was constant in his attendance at our meetings and took a deep interest in the work of the Society.

Canon Swain proposed the adoption of the report, which was seconded by Rev. Mr. Neil, supported by Chancellor Walker, and Sir Alexander Shaw, and adopted.
