The Attorney-General (Sir Gordon Hewart) said he would not state when the trial of the German war criminals would take place.

It is announced that as Queen Amalie of Portugal has just purchased the Chateau de Bellevue at Chussy, a suburb of Paris.

The Red Star Line steamer Inland left Antwerp en route for New York, carrying 920 emigrants, almost all Poles.

Lady Balfour has taken the oath as magistrate at Stoke Newington, and Mr. Connolly Bennett as a magistrate of North Hoxton.

Three men in an aeroplane carrying films of the Great National from Liverpool to London make a forced landing in a market garden at Romford.

A party of 60 farmers, with their wives and children, who left Liverpool on Saturday for "Annie" took with them £45,000 to invest in Canadian land.

Mr. J. J. "Clavering Children," which was sold at Christie's for 5,000 guineas last week, was bought by Mr. J. J. Clarke on behalf of Mr. John M. Corneak, the Irish tenor.

An arch is being erected at a cost of £7,000 by the Great Central Railway Company at Sheffield Victoria Station in memory of railway employees who fell in the war.

The first prize of £4,000 in the Grand National Sweepstake in Liverpool was won by a horse named "Hilda Roberts," the daughter of a British lion tamer.

M. Meyer Braun, Norwegian Minister of Commerce, states that the Russo-British trade agreement will remove the obstacles to an eventual Russo-Norwegian agreement.

The Bombay-Poona detective force has succeeded in arresting 25 persons, mostly Pathans, who are alleged to have conspired with the recent series of dacoities.

General Haking, the High Commissioner of the League of Nations at Dazig, was received in Warsaw by President Pilsudski, and also escorted by Prince Sapieha, the Polish Foreign Minister.

Sir Herbert Aspin, who is attached to the Financial Secretariat of the League of Nations, has resigned his seat in the Canadian House of Commons. His resignation leaves five Parliamentary seats without representation.

President Millard has directed that the railway season in which the Armistice of 1918 was signed is to be preserved as an historic relic at the Invalides in Paris.

Mr. Israel Cohen is on his way back to Palestine from India. He has raised altogether £115,000 in Australia and the East for the Palestine Restoration Fund.

The Ministry of Munitions and Shipping (Consolidation Bill) was read a second time in the House of Commons. The measure has already passed the House of Lords.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for University Scholarships in County Limerick.

I.—DATE OF OPERATION. For the present holders of Scholarships the regulations hereafter in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships to be awarded in July, 1921.

II.—NATURE AND VALUE OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS. a.—There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable as any constituent College of the N.U.I. which has adopted the O'Neill League Programme.

III.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerick for at least five years previous to the student presenting himself for examination.

IV.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50, may, at the discretion of the Council, be awarded a Scholarship.

V.—PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S SCHOLARSHIP. a.—Age limit. Students shall be eligible for Scholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of age on 1st June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers engaged in primary education in which case the age limit is 25.

VI.—ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. a.—References. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for competition, be required to refer to the Council his teacher or schoolmaster, the clergyman of his parish, his father, or some other person who is well known to the Council.

VII.—SUBJECTS FOR ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. The subjects of the examination shall be:—Irish, Irish History, Latin, French, German, Italian, Spanish, English, Arithmetic and Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Applied Mathematics, Botany, Zoology, Chemistry, and Physics.

VIII.—MATHEMATICS. 1. Arithmetic.—1. Compound Interest; Profit and Loss; the use of Logarithms. Books of Tables (to be used) will be supplied at the examination.

IX.—FRENCH. The Examination Papers will include:—1. Translation into French of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

X.—GERMAN. 1. Translation from German into Irish or English—any two of four passages (two prose, one verse, one scientific).

XI.—ITALIAN. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

XII.—SPANISH. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages (to be attempted by all candidates).

XIII.—LATIN. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

XIV.—ENGLISH. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

XV.—SCOTTISH GAELIC. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

XVI.—HISTORY. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

XVII.—PHYSICS. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).

XVIII.—CHEMISTRY. 1. Translation into Irish or English two prose passages of a general character (to be attempted by all candidates).
