LATEST NEWS.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

(SPECIAL TO THE CHRONICLE) ALLIES' ULTIMATUM TO GERMANY.

The Allied ultimatum was handed to the German Ambassador at Downing-street this morning.

M. Briand's Declaration. Before leaving London M. Briand said he believed the pressure now brought to bear on Germany would make her realise that she must carry out her obligations.

Another Reported Offer From Germany. Accepting Allies' Demands. A Washington message to the "New York Herald" says: "The State Department has learned that Germany has prepared another offer accepting the Allies' demands."

Ruhr Valley Occupation. Reuter learns that the Allies have decided to proceed from to-day with all preliminary measures for occupation of the Ruhr Valley.

German Debt. Reparation Committee's Decision. The Reparation Committee is to notify Germany of its decisions on the German Debt by May 15th.

DEATH OF BISHOP OF SALISBURY. Dr Frederik Ridgway, Bishop of Salisbury, died in a London nursing home late last night.

PENRITH VACANCY. Sir Cecil Lowther (Coalition Unionist), and M. Levi Colson (Independent Liberal), were to-day nominated for Penrith.

COAL FROM FRANCE. Scarborough Townsmen's Association has arranged for a constant supply of coal from France.

LIMERICK FOOD PRICES. First-Owing to difficulties of transit, supplies irregular and scarce. Salmon, 3s 6d per lb; whole, 2s 6d per lb.

DUBLIN CATTLE MARKET. THIS DAY. (BY TELEGRAPH.) Numbers-Beasts, 1,855; sheep, 5,066. Notwithstanding the removal of the embargo on the export of live stock, prices altogether presented a weaker undertone.

LIMERICK FISHERY BOARD. Mr A. Blood-Smyth, collector, presided at the meeting of the Limerick Fishery Board yesterday.

IRISH CATTLE TRADE. No further animals can be admitted to any British landing place until those already occupying it under quarantine have been moved away, and the place made ready for further consignments, according to the Department.

IRISH LINES CLOSED DOWN. The Great Southern and Western Railway Company announce that by the Military Authority the branch lines to Tuam, Athlone and Clara to Banagher will be closed from midnight to-night.

ILLEGAL DRILLING IN SCOTLAND. As the result of a raid by Dumfriesshire police on a company of 80 or 60 men who were alleged to have been found illegally drilling on a common moor above Renton on Saturday.

COAL FROM U.S. More Tonnage Chartered. The "Times" states: "Further tonnage was chartered on the Baltic Exchange yesterday for load coal in the U.S. for this country."

French commercial aeroplane, during March, made 435 flights, covered 34,782 miles, carried 845 passengers, nearly half a ton of letters, and over 11 tons of goods.

STOP PRESS NEWS

TERMS OF THE ULTIMATUM.

A later telegram says: "The terms of the ultimatum to Germany, and the substance of Reparation Payments issued officially to-day, show that Germany will be asked to pay 132 milliards of gold marks, less the amount already paid, and certain other sums to be credited to her."

DESTRUCTION OF MILITARY STORES IN DUBLIN. Our Dublin correspondent wires: "One of the most daring things connected with the destruction of military stores occurred this morning at the North Wall, which resulted in the complete wrecking of a store, known as the Liverpool Store, attached to the British-Irish Steampacket Company, which was burned to the ground shortly after 5 o'clock."

THE COAL CRISIS. Mr Thomas Optimistic. "Over Within a Week." It was stated at the Miners' Federation offices yesterday that the taking of the ballot on the Government Bill was a delicate question which only the Executive or a delegate conference could decide.

L G B ORDERS. The Limerick Technical Schools. On Tuesday in the King's Bench Division, before the Lord Chief Justice, Mr Justice Finlay, and Mr Justice Samuel, the arguments were resumed in the case of the King (Corporation of Limerick) v. Comerton.

IRISH ELECTIONS. Parliaments Summoned. The Lord Lieutenant signed yesterday the Proclamations summoning the meeting of the two Irish Parliaments.

WRITS ARRIVE IN LIMERICK. The writs in connection with the holding of the elections to the Southern Parliament were received to-day by Mr Benjamin K. Luce, Sub-Sheriff and Returning Officer.

MR DE VALERA AND THE ELECTIONS. In a proclamation to the Irish people, Mr De Valera, the electors for the Partition Parliaments to maintain the autonomy established in 1918, and declares the policy of Sinn Fein to be unchanged.

Sir James Craig and Mr De Valera. In a Banbridge speech, Sir James Craig said that if Sinn Fein were to express its views on the Partition of Ireland, it would be a matter for the benefit of Ireland as a whole.

LORD DUNRAVEN AND AN IRISH SETTLEMENT. The following appears in the Press: "Six.-In a multitude of counsellers there may be wisdom, but in a multitude of leagues and groups there is certainly loss of power."

RETIREMENT AFTER 40 YEARS' SERVICE. At Kniss Board of Guardians, Mr P. J. McNamara presiding, a letter was read from Mr Patrick Carmody, K.O., informing the Guardians of his intention to resign his office as relieving officer, being over 60 years of age, and having served for 40 years.

COMPLIMENTARY PRESENTATION. An interesting function took place in the city a few evenings ago, when Mr Joseph Quilgan, O'Connell Avenue, and late Limerick representative of the Anglo-American Oil Company, was presented by many friends in the city and district of the honorary title of "Citizen."

THE CASTLECONNELL TRAGEDY. In the House of Lords, on Tuesday, in reply to Lord Curzon, the Earl of Crawford said the full facts relating to the inquiry into the death of Mr O'Donovan at the Shannon Hotel, Castleconnell, were not yet in the hands of the Government.

GERMAN GOVERNMENT RESIGNS. As Result of U.S.A. Note. The German Government has decided to resign in view of the situation which has arisen in consequence of the reply of the United States Government.

SIR E CARSON AND THE BENCH. The London correspondent of the "Belfast News-Letter" says that Sir Edward Carson's acceptance of the vacant Lordship of Appeal is now practically certain, but he is to remain in Parliament till after Whitehaven, and "there are sound reasons for this," it is added, and "the Government is not disposed to hustle him."

DIocese OF KILLALOE. A special meeting of Killaloe West Diocesan Council was held in Neagh, the Bishop, Dr Barry presiding. The proposed new financial scheme was considered, amended and adopted.

SIR H HOWARD DEAD. Minister at the Vatican. The death is announced of Sir Henry Howard, formerly British Minister to the Holy See, says a Reuter's message from Rome.

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TRAGIC SEQUEL TO LIMERICK FUNERAL.

One Killed and Another Wounded.

The funeral of the late Henry Clancy, 4 Garvey's Range, who was fatally shot at Singland Bridge on Sunday evening, had a tragic sequel yesterday afternoon. The remains were removed from the morgue at the New Barracks to St John's Cathedral on Tuesday evening after the military inquiry held into the circumstances attending Henry Clancy's death.

THE STATE AND THE RAILWAYS.

The State control of the railways, British and Irish, which has been in operation since 1914, will cease on the 15th August next. For a considerable time past the Companies and the public have been awaiting a pronouncement as to the future policy of the Government with regard to the railways.

Official Report. Dublin Castle issued the following announcement last night: "During the progress of a funeral of a Sinn Feiner in Limerick today the police observed a number of suspicious-looking men making for the country by a circuitous route."

POLICE PATROL AMBUSHED IN KERRY. Eight Killed. A report from Dublin Castle last night stated: "A patrol of police in Kerry was ambushed, slaying one sergeant and eight constables, left Rathmore Station, Kerry County, this morning to bring in the dead body of a man lying on the road half a mile from Rathmore."

Attack in County Mayo. Four Policemen Killed. Four policemen were killed in the Tourmakeady (Co. Mayo) ambush on Tuesday, and two others were wounded.

Fight in County Limerick. According to an official report an attack was made on Tuesday on police constables returning in motor tenders from Hospital to Bruff by a party of civilians, about twenty-five in number, who were blockading the road.

Shots in Cork. Last evening shots were heard in Evergreen and South Douglas Road districts, Cork, and shortly afterwards a young man named Michael Collins was admitted to the South Infirmary with a punctured wound in the high.

THE MAYOR RELEASED. The Mayor, Alderman S.M. O'Mara, who was arrested on Thursday morning last at his father's residence, Strand House, and imprisoned for seven days for failing to pay a fine of £10 for non-attendance with a military summons, was released yesterday afternoon. The release took place at half-past 7 o'clock.

SIXMILE-BRIDGE SIGNALMAN'S RETURN. Temporary Signalman Maher, who was removed from the signal box at Sixmile-bridge station at midnight on the 25th of last month by armed and masked men, returned home yesterday at midday. Maher, who was none the worse for his captivity, was unable to give any account whatever of his whereabouts for more than a week.

COURTMARTIAL RESULTS. Results of trials by Courtmartial officially announced and published include the following: E. O'Dwyer, 4 Richmond-street, Limerick, was tried at Limerick. It was stated that at Limerick a police sergeant observed a suspicious looking motor running round a corner. He followed it, was unable to catch it, and found him hidden in the fifth under a bed. He dragged him out and asked him his name, and the accused said that it was John Euseull. He turned out to be O'Dwyer, who robbed a soldier of his revolver, and had since been "on the run." He was sentenced to five years' penal servitude.

John Clancy, 31 Cross road, Limerick, charged with being in possession of a notebook relating to movements of police and military in Limerick, and other matters relating to people who were friendly towards police and military, was sentenced to one year with hard labour.

Thomas McNeill, Doonbeg, Kiltross, Co. Clare, F.G.U.M. Limerick, 8/4/21, at Moyra on 4/1/20 together with others unknown, assaulted and imprisoned Constable Simon O'Dea. When the constable was arrested he identified McNeill as one of the men who carried a revolver which he pointed at the constable. Eighteen months with hard labour.

THE "CAMERONIA". The "Cameronia", the second new oil-burning steamer to be completed since the war for the Cunard and Anchor Fleets, will make her first voyage from Liverpool to New York on Wednesday next (11th instant). She is a big passenger liner of 16,700 tons, with a length of over 570 feet and a beam of 70 feet. Like all new Cunarders she is driven by double reduction geared turbines. Her passenger accommodation is thoroughly up-to-date and unusually comprehensive for a ship of her size, and includes lounges, writing rooms, smoking rooms, gymnasium and verandah cafe. The state-rooms are fitted up mostly for two, three, or four passengers. Special attention has been paid to the dining and accommodation, and the cabins in this part of the ship are unusually spacious.

William Allen, painter, who was fired at on Sunday night while in a field near Casey's Road, and stated to be seriously wounded in the abdomen, is still a patient in Barrington's Hospital. The bullet fortunately did not pierce the boy's lungs and fears of peritonitis setting in will, it is expected, be averted. The young fellow, who is named, is a Limerick man, who was shot and wounded last evening near the Fair Green in a hospital in a critical condition.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick. I - NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupils' parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense of his or her education. The Committee (whoever they may be) have power to make a student who is not exceeding 210 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expense incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II - CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gaelic League Education Programme as modified by Dal Bricain, viz., (a) Irish to be the official School language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for vernacular use to each child for at least one hour per day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils. (d) The Secondary School, which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gaelic League Programme for secondary schools, viz. Irish to be taught to all pupils for vernacular use. (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each paper examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III - TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examinations, (b) the annual school examinations at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelic College, where the pupil will spend a season in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are: - At the end of First Year - Story of Ireland (tested Bilingual) of Beata Naomh Padraig - Bilingual. At the end of Second Year - Mitchell's History of Ireland and State of Ireland Part I (English or Nostrail). At the end of Third Year - Last Conquest and Sean A'Naimias, "Eire" (Donan Mac). At the end of Fourth Year - The Irish Wars, by J.J. O'Connell, M.A., and Sothar ar Sean Iogais. By Sean O'Connell, T.D.

IV - RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V - OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship, of value of £40 but those whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), as the Committee shall decide, according to the circumstances of the parents.

VI - AGE LIMIT. Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June.

VII - REFERENCES. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his School, together with a medical certificate as to fitness, and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character.

VIII - AWARDS. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, &c.

IX - EXAMINATION. Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination - oral and written - to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee.

X - GENERAL POWERS. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, subject to the sanction of the Limerick County Council.

SYLLABUS. The following is the list of subjects for examination (written and oral) as may be necessary: - IRISH, ENGLISH, HISTORY, LITERATURE, FRENCH, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOGRAPHY, BOTANY, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, RURAL SCIENCE, GEOMETRY, and ENGLISH. Irish and Irish History are essential; any other three subjects from the foregoing list. 100 marks will be assigned to each subject. No award will be made to any candidate who has not passed in each of the five subjects (80%) and secured at least 250 marks out of the aggregate 500.

AN GARDHAIR - Seada 50 pp., Part I. (Reading and Dictation). Aids to Irish Composition by the Christian Brothers. (The whole Book).

IRISH HISTORY - "Cathach" of the History of Ireland, by W. J. O'Neill Daunt - Chapters I-XVIII inclusive. Christian Brothers' Irish History Reader.

ARITHMETIC - Four Primary Rules. Decimals and Fractions with simple problems thereon. Simple percentages (profit and loss). The Utility System.

GEOGRAPHY - General - The Map of the World and Ireland; Special - Ireland, her ancient and modern Divisions, Great Rivers, Harbours, Mountains, Towns, Bogs, Mines, Agricultural and other products. More particular knowledge of the County of Limerick.

GEOMETRY - Euclid - Books I and II. BOTANY - (a) Terms - Root, Stem, Leaf, Stipules, Bracts, Flower, Calyx, Corolla, Stamens, Pistils, Fruit, Seed Receptacle and Nectary. (b) To recognise fifty plants; to know their names in Irish and English; (c) To be able to give a brief account of the locality and uses of twenty plants; (d) Four Nat. orders, twelve specimens from each with Irish and local names.

RURAL SCIENCE - (1) Examination of a simple plant and its parts; (2) Flowers - their structure and uses; (3) Fruits - disposal of seeds and uses of fruits; (4) Water, soil, and buds; (5) Seeds and germination; (6) Work of roots, stems and leaves; (7) Plant propagation; (8) Climate and weather - weather charts; (9) Construction and uses of barometer and thermometer - hygrometer and rain gauge; (10) Study of the soil, how formed, erosion and denudation, sedimentation, rocks and rock of vegetable origin; (11) Recognition of common wild flowers, shrubs and trees with their Irish names; (12) With special reference to the soil and geological formation of Co. Limerick.

DOMESTIC ECONOMY - (1) General - Elements of sanitation in the dwelling-house; principles of personal cleanliness; principles of ventilation and of dust and dirt; principles of care of, and cleaning of, articles of household use; home weights and measures; arrangement of daily and weekly work in small houses; buying of supplies and apportionment of expenditure; elementary principles and practice of first aid to sick persons and first aid to burns, and care of sick persons in the home. (2) Cookery - Principles and practice of simple home cookery as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools; (3) Laundry - Principles and practice of simple home laundry work as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools; (4) Needlework - Plain Needlework cutting out and knitting as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools.

ENGLISH - Poetry - "The Four Winds of Erin," E. Carbery; Literature in Irish - Irish Verse - Selected, by Yeats, Prose - The Letters of Wella Tem; a written Letter or Essay; Reading and Dictation.

ALGEBRA - Up to and including Simple Equations with simple problems thereon; Elementary and Easy Fractions.

All Papers will be set in Irish and English. LATIN - (1) Caesar de Bello Gallico. Book IV, chaps 20-35, and Book V, chaps 1-33, both inclusive; (2) Short Sentences for translations from English into Latin, the Latin for the more difficult words being supplied; (3) A passage or passages from some of the best Greek or Latin translations of Homer; (4) Roman History from the foundation of Rome to B.C. 264.

FRENCH - (1) Malot - Remi - see Amis, chaps 1-3 inclusive (from Sans Famille, pt. I, chaps 19-21); Questions in French to be answered in French; (2) A passage or passages from some of the best French work or works for translation at eight; (3) Short sentences, colloquial phrases, and a passage for translation from English into French.
