THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT of the above Asylum, at their meeting to be held on WEDNESDAY, the 11th MAY, 1921, will consider tenders for supplying and making about 37 Suits of Uniform for the Attendants, in navy blue serge, of Irish manufacture. Each suit to consist of coat, vest, and two pairs of trousers, and samples of the serge to be submitted with tender. The material must be guaranteed Irish manufacture, the name of the maker to be stamped on each piece, and also the Irish Trade Mark, and must be submitted to the Storekeeper for inspection before being made up. The suits are to be applied within six weeks from date of acceptance of tender. The accepted contractor shall be required to observe the terms of the "Fair Wage" Clause and the bespoke label must be attached to each suit. 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LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick. I.—NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. II.—CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gaelic League Education Programme as modified by Dall Eirionn, viz., (a) Irish to be the official School Language, (b) Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, etc., (c) Irish to be taught for one hour per week, (d) Irish to be taught for at least one hour per day, (e) Irish History to be taught to all pupils. (B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gaelic League Programme for Secondary Schools, viz., Irish to be taught (a) as a compulsory subject, (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils, (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I. III.—TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination, (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelic College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, and whose parents or guardians be taught through the medium of Irish. The course for the Special History Examinations are:—At the end of First Year—Story of Ireland (taught Bilingual); of Beasts Naomh Padraig—Bilingual. At the end of Second Year—Micheal Part I (English and Gaelic). At the end of Third Year—Lionel Conquest and Sean A'Almainn, "Eire" (Last Gaelic). At the end of Fourth Year—The Irish Wars, by J. J. O'Connell, M.A. and Saothar ar Sean i gcein. By Sean O'Ceallaigh, E.D. IV.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of other than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), as the Committee shall decide, according to the circumstances of the parents. VI.—AGE LIMIT. Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June. VII.—REFERENCES. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his School, together with a medical certificate as to fitness, and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character. VIII.—AWARDS. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, &c. IX.—EXAMINATION. Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination—oral and written—to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee. X.—GENERAL POWERS. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, subject to the sanction of the Limerick County Council. SYLLABUS. The following is the list of subjects for examination (written and oral) as may be necessary:—IRISH, IRISH HISTORY, LATIN, FRENCH, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOGRAPHY, BOTANY, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, RURAL SCIENCE, GEOMETRY, and ENGLISH. Irish and Irish History are essential; any other three subjects from the foregoing list. 100 marks will be assigned to each subject. No award will be made to any candidate who has not passed in each of the five subjects (80% and secured at least 250 marks out of the aggregate 500. AN GABHLEAG—Séadna 50 pp., Part I. RURAL SCIENCE—(1) Examination of a simple plant and its parts; (2) Flowers—their structure and uses; (3) Fruits—disposal of seeds and uses of fruits; (4) Winter twigs and buds; (5) Seeds and germination; (6) Work to be done in the dairy; (7) Plant propagation; (8) Climate and weather—weather charts; (9) Construction and uses of barometer and thermometer—hygrometer and rain gauge; (10) "Study of the soil, how formed, erosion and denudation, sedimentary rocks and rocks of vegetable origin; (11) Recognition of common wild flowers, shrubs and trees with their Irish names. With special reference to the soil and geological formation of Co Limerick. A P.A. message from Belfast states that District Inspector Ferris had just left St. Paul's Presbytery on Sunday when he was fired at by some of the Volunteers. He was wounded in the hand and leg.

KERRY HEAD CONSTABLE Shot Dead Leaving Church.

Head Constable Storey, of Castledare Baracks, was shot dead while leaving Castledare Catholic Church on Sunday morning. The deceased, who served as a sergeant at Passage West for some years, and was well known in that district and in Cork, was transferred to Castledare about six months ago.

PREMIER AND THE PEACE MOVE.

Speaking on Saturday at Maidstone, Mr. Lloyd George made the following reference to Ireland:—"All I will say about Ireland is that I am very delighted to hear that the two national leaders—the leader who represents the North of Ireland and the leader who represents the South of Ireland—have met together to discuss all questions bearing on the future of the country to which they belong."

BANK MANAGER HELD UP.

The Manager of the Northern Bank, Newtownstewart, was held up on Friday night, while making a large sum of money. He fled on the man, who fled. The police later made three arrests.—Central News.

MAN SHOT DEAD IN CORK SUBURB.

A Cork correspondent says:—"The body of a man found shot dead in the suburbs of Cork on Saturday afternoon has been identified as that of James Carroll, residing at 7 Charlotte Quay, Cork. He was an ex-Limerick dealer, and a native of Drumoller, Co. Limerick."

FACTS AND FANCIES.

THE GREAT BOG FEAST. In medieval England egg feasts in some form or other were general during the days immediately preceding Lent. At Oxford the Saturday before Shrove Tuesday for centuries known as Egg Saturday, from the egg feast held in the city on that day.

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THE FIRST AIR-BALLOONS.

Air balloons were invented by a Jesuit in 1782; revived in France by M. Montgolfier, 1783; an ascent was made in Paris that year. In 1784 they were introduced into England, when a Mr. Lambert ascended from Moorfields, Mr. Hutton's Field, and Dr. Jefferies ascended in one from London to Cullin in two hours, January 7th, 1785.

Translation from Spanish into Irish or English (in prose) of a general character (for literary candidates), or (b) a translation from Spanish into Irish or English (in prose) of a general character (for Commercial candidates).

PAPER-WRITING.—The paper set or both Stages will be similar in respect of character, but different in respect of difficulty. 1. Candidates will be required to draw up a Free Compo, a brief and clear statement in the form of a narrative.

III.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerick for at least 20 years previous to the date of their admission.

IV.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50, may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship.

V.—PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO FIRST YEAR'S SCHOLARSHIPS. A.—Age limit. Students shall be eligible for Scholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of age on 1st June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and to teachers.

VI.—ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

Every candidate for a Scholarship shall be required to produce a satisfactory reference from his teacher or School Manager, also the clergyman of his parish. He shall also produce a medical certificate as to fitness, and a birth certificate giving his name and address in his current Irish form.

VII.—SUBJECTS FOR ENTRANCE EXAMINATION.

The subjects of the examination shall be:—Irish, Irish History, Latin, French, German, Italian, Spanish, English, Arithmetic and Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Applied Mathematics, Domestic Science, Experimental Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geography, Commerce. A theoretical paper will be set in each subject.

MATHEMATICS.

1. Composition.—Writing of an essay set of a précis or passage or other matter supplied. Other questions will be set to test understanding of the meaning of the language. 2. Exercises.—Questions will be set in (a) intelligent reading (but not detailed study) of two books prescribed from time to time; (b) general knowledge of other well-known works in prose and verse.
