Clare Man Charged.

At the New Barracks, Limerick, to-day, before a Field General Court-martial, Thomas Wolfe, Ensign, was charged under 42 A.A. of the R.O.C. with soliciting a soldier to sell ammunition to the enemy on the 13th May.

CROWN FORCES AMBUSHED.

CLARE LARCENY CHARGE

Before Limerick Court-martial

A Field General Court-martial sat at the New Barracks, Limerick, this morning, when James Pierce, Clonsilla, and John Murphy, Cork Alley, were charged with the larceny of a rifle, a revolver, a pocket watch, and a watch chain, the property of Jeremiah Davoren, of Clonsilla, on the 23rd November.

ORDNANCE SURVEY IN IRELAND.

The Ordnance Survey report for March 31 states that under the Government of Ireland Act the Survey of Ireland passes under the control of the new Irish Government, and will cease to be administered by the Ministry of Agriculture and Fisheries.

A FIVE MONTHS' DROUGHT.

The meteorological correspondent of "The Times" writes in an article on the threatening appearance of the sky, there was again only a few trifling showers in the South of England on Monday, most districts ceasing altogether.

BRUFF SHOOTING.

Young Man Wounded.

Kilmallock, Tuesday.—It is reported from Bruff that a young man named Patrick O'Brien, draper's assistant, and a native of Baginbun, was fired at and wounded by Crown forces about one o'clock yesterday morning.

RESIDENCES BURNED.

In Bandon District.

Bandon, Wednesday.—Skevanagh House, Inchmahon, the residence of Mrs Peacock, whose sister was killed in the last night's shooting, was burned down. The fire was caused by a fire on a fine one, a large sum of money was expended in remodeling it about ten years ago.

RELIEVING OFFICER'S SUPER-ANNUATION.

At the meeting of the Ennis Board of Guardians, the principal business was the consideration of the proposal to grant a superannuation allowance to Mr P. Carmody, on his retirement from the position of relieving officer, which he faithfully held for forty years, and that ten years be added to his service in order to grant him the maximum pension.

THE TOURIST SEASON.

It is stated, says the "Kilrush Herald," that some visitors are arriving in Kilkesh, Lahinch, and Lisdoonvarna. With the settlement of the coal strike, which is expected immediately, the West Clare Railway is expected to give a good service to enable the public to come to the summer resorts.

EMIGRATION FROM IRELAND.

1,791 emigrants (688 males, 1,095 females), net of Ireland left this country in May, as compared with 1,539 (607 males, 932 females) in May, 1920. 68 went from Munster, 817 from Ulster, 431 from Connaught, and 116 from Leinster. 1,461 went to U.S.A., and 238 to Canada. 448 had their passages paid for in America.

REPRISALS QUESTION.

The new policy regarding reprisals in Ireland was explained to the "Evening News" by a high Government official on Tuesday. Sir H. Greenwood has stated that the Commander-in-Chief has issued orders that every action taken against property must be based on strictly military grounds, defined by military orders.

THE TEST MATCH.

A correspondent writing in the London "Evening Standard" of Tuesday says: "I came from the coast of the Bay of Biscay, feeling that though England was in a bad way, but prospects for the remaining tests are very much brighter than after Nottingham. There was about the English batting an air of confidence and competence lacking in previous innings. We were a good deal afraid of the Australian bowling, and that is half way to free scoring of it."

COURTS-MARTIAL RESULTS.

Results of Field General Court-martial announced at Military G.H.Q., Parkgate street, Dublin, yesterday, include the following: Michael Heaney, Ballybricken, Co. Limerick was tried at Limerick, 25-5-21. House was searched on April 29th last. Accused was in bed and had his name as MacDonnell. A rifle was found in a haystack, of which accused denied a false name only. Sentence, 1 year with hard labour.

POST OFFICE BICYCLES TAKEN IN LISTOWEL.

At 10 o'clock, or thereabouts, on Sunday morning two armed and disguised men entered the Telephone Exchange in Upper William street, Listowel, and decamped with two bicycles, which had shortly before been deposited there by two local cyclists from Tralee, leaving a receipt, signed "I.R.A."

BALLYBUNION WIRELESS STATION RAIDED.

Dublin Castle reports issued on Tuesday include the following: At midnight on the 11th inst. the Marconi Wireless Station at Ballybunion, Co. Kerry, was raided by about nine armed and masked men. Telephone apparatus and engineers' tools were taken.

LAND MINE IN KERRY.

Three Casualties.

A Train correspondent says:—A military party on lorries, going from Castleisland to Tralee, was stopped on the road at Ballydwyer by a couple of trees which had been felled across the road. The obstruction seemed so trifling that some of the party went to remove it, when, to their astonishment, a mine exploded, seriously wounding three of the party and blowing up a large section of the road.

MR LLOYD GEORGE AND THE IRISH QUESTION.

Speaking to the Calvinistic Methodists of Tralee, Mr Lloyd George said:—A party in Ireland representing two-thirds of the population of that island demand complete severance from the United Kingdom, and the setting up of an independent Republic. Every effort I have made, publicly and otherwise to secure a modification of that demand has completely failed.

THE ENGINEERING TRADE.

Employers' Notices Postponed. The engineering employers have agreed to postpone their notices until the end of June, to enable the Unions to submit their latest wages proposals to a ballot of the men.

LORD CARSON'S BROTHER DEAD.

Their father, the late Mr. Edward Henry Carson, C.B.E., was born in Harcourt-street, Dublin, and was a member of the Dublin Corporation in the seventies of the last century. He was some time Vice-President of the Royal Institute of Architects.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

(SPECIAL TO THE CHRONICLE) THE MINERS' BALLOT. Big Majorities Against Acceptance. Cumberland miners are voting two to one against accepting the owners' terms. Derbyshire miners at present show a majority against acceptance.

SYRIA.

French Resume Hostilities. Athens, Wednesday. A newspaper message from Smyrna states that the French have resumed hostilities in Syria. General Gouraud, marching on Aleppo, has crushed the enemy by artillery fire.

UPPER SILESIA.

German Attack French Troops. Paris, Thursday. The Germans attacked French troops near Kosel, Upper Silesia, killing and wounding many. Two British Report d Killed. It is reported that two British were killed and several wounded by Germans at Kottmar.

SEIZURE OF MACHINE-GUNS.

On Belfast Bound Vessel. New York, Thursday. Six hundred Thompson machine-guns, smuggled on a vessel bound for Belfast, were discovered and seized yesterday by the Customs. It is alleged the arms had been stored. The owners were unaware they were aboard.

ATTACK ON TROOP TRAIN AT DUBLIN.

Three soldiers were wounded, one seriously, in an attack on a troop train at Dublin this morning. Our Dublin correspondent wires that heavy explosions and discharge of shots were heard about 8.30 o'clock. Later it transpired that a troop train on the G.S. & W.R. Loop Line was attacked in the vicinity of Drumcondra. Bombs are stated to have been thrown and shots fired, but so far as is known there were no casualties.

BOMB EXPLOSION AT RINGSEND.

A lorry containing Crown forces was passing through Ringsend this morning a bomb explosion took place near the lorry. There were few people about and some shots were fired. No casualties are reported. Ringesed bottle works were subsequently visited and a young man arrested.

THE POPE AND THE CARDINALATE

The Pope to-day was greeted with cries of "Long live the Pope of Peace" on the holding of a public Consistory at the Vatican, in which he imparted the Red Hat to six new Cardinals.

EAST HERTFORD POLLING.

London to-day is considering the employers' application for a national wages reduction of fifteen shillings for men, and five and sixpence for women.

LONDON'S WATER SUPPLY.

London, like Dublin, Belfast, and other places, is threatened with a reduction of its water supply, and a warning is issued against extravagance in domestic arrangements. The daily passage of water in the Thames Valley is lower than it has been since 1819, and there is a shortage of reservoir accommodation, while the coal shortage has had a serious effect on pumping.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL. Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick. I.—NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupil's parents or guardians are in a position to bear a part of the expense of his or her education. The Committee shall, however, have power to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II.—CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gaelic League Educational Programme as modified by Dail Eireann, viz.: (a) Irish to be the official School Language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Call, orders, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for at least one hour per week to each child at least one hour per day. (c) Irish to be taught to all pupils. (B) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gaelic League Programme for Secondary Schools, viz.: Irish to be taught to all pupils; (b) Irish to be taught to all pupils; (c) All Examination Papers to be set in both English and Irish, each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III.—TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination, (b) the annual school examination at the end of the academic year, (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelic College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee, until certified as able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are:—(a) At the end of First Year—Story of Ireland (tested Billogally) of Beata Naomh Padraig—Bilingual. At the end of Second Year—Mitchell's History of Ireland and State in Kilkenny Park (Eogan o Neachtain). At the end of Third Year—Last Conquest and Sean A'Daimh, "Bire" (Conan Maol). At the end of Fourth Year—The Irish Wars, by J. J. O'Connell, M.A. and Another and Sean I goela. By Sean O'Connell, T.D.

IV.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years. V.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced), as the Committee shall decide, according to the circumstances of the parents.

VI.—AGE LIMIT. Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June. VII.—REFERENCES. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his School, together with a medical certificate as to fitness, and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character.

VIII.—AWARDS. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, &c. IX.—EXAMINATION. Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination—oral and written—to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee.

X.—GENERAL POWERS. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, subject to the sanction of the Limerick County Council.

XI.—SUBJECTS. The following is the list of subjects for examination (written and oral) as may be necessary:—IRISH, IRISH HISTORY, LATIN, FRENCH, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOGRAPHY, BOTANY, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, RURAL SCIENCE, GEOMETRY, and ENGLISH. Irish and Irish History are essential; any other three will be assigned to each subject. 100 marks will be assigned to each subject. No award will be made to any candidate who has not passed in each of the five subjects (30%) and secured at least 250 marks out of the aggregate 500.

AN GARDHUA—Seadan 50 pp., Part I. (Reading and Dictation). Aids to the Composition by the Christian Brother. (The whole Book). IRISH HISTORY—"Catechism of the History of Ireland," by W. J. O'Neill Daunt—Chapters I-xviii inclusive. Christian Brothers' Irish History Reader.

ARITHMETIC—Four Primary Rules. Denials and Fractions with simple problems thereon. The Metric System. (Profit and Loss). The Unitary System. GEOGRAPHY—General—The Map of the World and Ireland; Special—Ireland, her ancient and modern Divisions, Great Rivers, Harbours, Mountains, Towns, Bogs, Mines, Agriculture, and other products. More particular knowledge of the County of Limerick.

GEOMETRY—Euclid—Books I and II. BOTANY—(a) Terms—Root, Stem, Leaf, Stipules, Bracts, Flower, Calyx, Corolla, Stamens, Pistils, Fruit, Seed Receptacle and Nectary; (b) To recognise fifty plants; to know their names in Irish and English; (c) To be able to give a brief account of the locality and uses of twenty plants; (d) Four Nat. orders, twelve specimens from each with Irish and local names.

RURAL SCIENCE—(1) Examination of a simple plant and its parts; (2) Flowers—their structure and uses; (3) Fruit—disposal of seed and uses of fruit; (4) Winter turgid buds; (5) Seeds and germination; (6) Work of roots, stems and leaves; (7) Plant propagation; (8) Climate and weather—weather charts; (9) Construction and uses of barometer and thermometer—hygrometer and rain gauge; (10) "Study of the soil, how formed, erosion and denudation, secondary rocks and rocks of vegetable origin; (11) Recognition of common wild flowers, shrubs and trees with their Irish names. \*With special reference to the soil and geological formation of Co. Limerick.

DOMESTIC ECONOMY—(1) General—Elements of personal cleanliness; disposal of refuse and dangers of dust and dirt; principles of care of, and cleaning of, articles of household use; homely weights and measures; arrangement of daily and weekly work in small houses; buying of supplies and appearance of expenditure; elementary principles of the practice of First Aid treatment of cuts, bruises and burns, and care of sick persons in the home. (2) Cookery—Principles and practice of simple home cookery as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools; (3) Laundry—Principles and practice of simple home laundry work taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools; (4) Needlework—Plain Needlework, cutting out and knitting as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools.

ENGLISH—Poetry—"The Four Winds of Eire," E. Carbery; Literature in Ireland, Irish Verse; Selection, by Yeats. French—The Letters of Voltaire; a written Letter or Essay; Reading and Dictation.

ALGEBRA—Up to and including Simple Equations with simple problems thereon; Elementary and Easy Fractions. ENGLISH—(1) Essay: Bemis; at Amis, chapter 1-3 inclusive; from Sans. Fenimore, pt. 1, chaps 19-21). Questions in French to be answered in French. (2) A passage or passages from some other French work or works for translation at sight. (3) Short sentences, colloquial phrases, and a passage for translation from English into French.

All Papers will be set in Irish and English. LATIN—(1) Caesar de Bello Gallico. Book IV, chaps 20-38, and Book V, chaps 1-33, both inclusive; (2) Short Sentences for translations from English into Latin, and Latin for the more difficult words being supplied; (3) Passage or passages from some other Latin work or works for translation at sight; (4) Roman History from the foundation of Rome to B.C. 284.
