COUNTY LIMERICK LABOUR COMMANDERED.

Found Shot Dead in Clare. At three o'clock on Friday a party of police found the dead body of Patrick D'Arcy, aged 27, at Doonbeg, County Clare, a school teacher, who had disappeared from his home at Corowade, County Clare, the previous night.

REPORTED KIDNAPPING OF LORD BANDON. Castle Bernard Set on Fire. The Press Association says—A Cork message says that Castle Bernard, the residence of Lord Bandon, was practically destroyed by armed men to-day. The place was set on fire.

ROSCOMMON VILLAGES.

Reported Destroyed. It is reported that Knockroghery, near Roscommon, containing fifty houses, was destroyed to-day by incendiary bombs.

DISASTROUS COLLIERY EXPLOSION.

In Germany—68 Deaths. Berlin, Tuesday. An explosion, due to fire damp, occurred yesterday in Mont Cenis pit, near Geln. Sixty-eight persons were killed and seventy-three injured.

ARCHBISHOPRIC OF SALISBURY.

Meibourne, Tuesday—Archbishop Donalson has been appointed to the Archbishopric of Salisbury, and sails for England the end of October.

REPORTED JEWELLERY ROBBERY.

On Byard Ship. Paris, Tuesday—An Aquitaine has wirelessed Cherbourg that on the voyage from New York a serious jewellery robbery occurred aboard.

OFFER OF PEACEFUL SOLUTION.

Rome, Wednesday. A semi-official statement says that an exchange of views has resulted, unanimously to make an offer of peaceful solution to Athens.

POLAND'S ECONOMIC LIFE.

Reuter says—A Warsaw telegram states that a Conference of the great industrial magnates in Upper Silesia has been held on the invitation of the Polish insurgent authorities for the purpose of restoring the economic life of the country.
