STARTLING CITY OCCURRENCE

SHOTS FIRED AT POLICE

A Civilian Fatally Shot. Two Others Wounded

A most regrettable occurrence took place in the city shortly after eight on Saturday night involving a bullet which fell on one man, and struck two others. The shooting was done, and there were a number of persons about for a promenade, when quite suddenly the sound of firing was heard in the direction of Sarsfield Bridge and Mill-street. It is alleged that the firing was done from a concealed position in Mill-street, just after leaving William street. They proceeded down Sarsfield street, and were crossing Sarsfield Bridge when, as alleged, shots were fired at them, across the river, from the Arthur's Quay side. They returned to the bridge, and for about ten minutes a riotous shooting was heard at intervals in the Englishtown and Clare street districts. The constabulary from William street and a party of military from the Strand Barracks were speedily on the alert. The constabulary ascertained that there had been a skirmish, one of no moment, however, in its result at least in Clare street, where a guard on duty at Arthur's Quay, while the military moved by way of Thomond Bridge into the Englishtown locality, in which, unfortunately, Michael McNamara was shot under very sad circumstances. It was here also that a young man named David Carroll was wounded, dangerously. It was stated on Sunday, but the account yesterday was more hopeful, showing that he was not wounded in the abdomen. Michael Mulqueen, 60, who was taken to Harrington's Hospital for treatment of a wound in the leg, is reported to be progressing favorably. LIMERICK TRAGEDY

Man Shot Dead

The dead body of a man, whose name is supposed to be Loherty, a Limerick ex-serviceman, was found lying near the old toll-house, Athluskard Bridge, this morning by a resident of the locality who happened to be passing at the time. The deceased was a middle-aged man, aged about 40 years, and is said to have been unmarried. There were two bullet wounds in the body—one over the heart and another in the head. A label was attached to the clothing bearing the words: "Tried, convicted, and executed, L.R.A. Spies beware." The remains were removed to the Corporation mortuary, and a military inquest will be held at the military morgue, New Barracks.

SEVEN O'CLOCK CURFEW

In Large City Area

A Proclamation, which took effect last evening, was issued yesterday by Colonel Commandant Cameron, C.B., C.M.G., Military Governor of Limerick, stating: "Every person residing in the area below mentioned in the County of Limerick shall remain indoors between the hours of 7 P.M. and 7 A.M. on every day. And no one shall enter or leave the said area between these hours." THE WOUNDED IN HOSPITAL

IRISH PEACE MOVE

Formal Reply by Mr De Valera

Dublin, Monday.—The Special Correspondent of the Press Association, Dublin, writes to-day: The only formal development which has occurred to-day on this issue in connection with the Premier's invitation to Mr De Valera is a formal reply by the Irish Leader. This was issued to-day on the authority of the "Irish Bulletin" in the following terms: "The President De Valera has received the British Premier's letter. A reply will be sent in due course." "I understand that the Premier's letter was delivered to Mr De Valera personally by a special messenger, and that the Irish Leader's only comment was that he would have to lay the matter before his colleagues. This was the course naturally expected of him. Consultation among Sinn Fein leaders is not yet easy matter under present circumstances, but that Daily Kieran said functionaries and that a meeting will be convened to discuss the matter is beyond doubt. The possibility of a truce to facilitate a meeting is being widely discussed, but I understand that the intention of the authorities not to do anything to hinder an interchange of views between the Sinn Fein leaders. The reception given to the Premier's letter in Dublin has almost without exception been cordial in all quarters. The Daily Press to-day speaks in its approval, and there is a remarkable absence of the scepticism which has greeted earlier peace overtures. This is due chiefly to the absence of conditions and qualifications which the Sinn Fein leaders have previously considered such as to render negotiations useless or impossible. Sinn Fein opinion is under present circumstances to a great extent unimpaired and untroubled, but the impression created by the Premier's invitation to Sinn Fein circles is reported to be favorable. What the reply will be cannot be foretold, but the view widely prevails that Mr De Valera and his colleagues will make a wise decision if they deliberately reject the invitation." Cardinal Logue's Impression. When the Premier's letter was read over the telephone by a "Free Press" representative to Cardinal Logue at Armagh his Eminence said he regarded the new situation as not without a gleam of hope. The newspapers state that some motives for the acceptance of Mr Lloyd George's invitation on the part of Mr De Valera may arise out of the current developments in the United States.' 'The World' states that Mr De Valera will be wise to take into consideration the fact that Mr De Valera and Sir James Craig, as that out of it meeting may come some compromise that will spare Ireland further bloodshed."

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL

Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick.

I.—NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS. Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship...

II.—CONDITIONS OF TENURE. (A) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gaelic League Education Programme...

III.—TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS. The tenure of these Scholarships shall be for four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress...

IV.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years.

V.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship...

VI.—AGE LIMIT. Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June.

VII.—REFERENCES. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager...

VIII.—AWARDS. Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit.

IX.—EXAMINATION. Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination—oral and written—to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee.

X.—GENERAL POWERS. The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason.

The following is the list of subjects for examination (written and oral) as may be necessary:

IRISH, IRISH HISTORY, LATIN, FRENCH, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOGRAPHY, BOTANY, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, RURAL SCIENCE, GEOMETRY, and ENGLISH.

IRISH HISTORY—"Catechism of the History of Ireland," by W. J. O'Neill Deant—Chapters I-xviii inclusive.

ARITHMETIC—Four Primary Rules. Denominate and Fractions with simple problems thereon.

GEOGRAPHY—General—The Map of the World and Ireland; Special—Ireland, her ancient and modern Divisions, Great Rivers, Harbours, Mountains, Towns, Bogs, Mines, Agricultural and other products.

BOTANY—(a) Terms—Root, Stem, Leaf, Stipules, Bracts, Flower, Calyx, Corolla, Stamens, Pistil, Fruit, Seed, Receptacle and Nectary; (b) To recognise fifty plants; to know their names in Irish and English; (c) To be able to give a brief account of the locality and uses of twenty plants.

RURAL SCIENCE—(1) Examination of a simple plant and its parts; (2) Flowers—their structure and uses; (3) Fruits—disposal of seeds and use of fruits; (4) Winter twigs and buds; (5) Seeds and germination; (6) Work on roots, stems and leaves; (7) Plant propagation; (8) Climate and weather—weather charts; (9) Construction and use of barometer and thermometer—hygrometer and rain gauge; (10) "Study of the soil, how formed, erosion and denudation, sedimentary rocks and rocks of vegetable origin."

DOMESTIC ECONOMY—(1) General—Elements of sanitation in the dwelling-house; principles of personal cleanliness; disposal of refuse and dangers of dust and dirt; principles of care of and cleaning of articles of household use; homely weights and measures; arrangement of daily and weekly work in small houses; buying of supplies and apportionment of expenditure; elementary principles and practice of First Aid treatment of cuts, bruises and burns; and care of sick persons in the home.

(2) Cookery—Principles and practice of simple home cookery as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools; (3) Laundry—Principles and practice of simple home laundry work as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools; (4) Needlework—Plain Needlework, cutting out and knitting as taught to sixth and seventh classes in Primary Schools.

ENGLISH—Poetry—"The Four Winds of Erin," E. Carbery; Literature in Ireland. "Irish Verse," Selected, by Yeats. Prose—"The Letters of Wolfe Tone"; a written Letter or Essay; Reading and Dictation.

ALGEBRA—Up to and including Simple Equations with simple problems thereon; Elementary and Easy Fractions.

FRENCH—(1) Malot: Romi et ses Amis, chaps 1-3 inclusive (from Sans Famille, pt 1, chaps 19-21); (2) Questions in French to be answered in French; (3) A passage or passages from some other French work or works for translation as sight; (3) Short sentences, colloquial phrases, and a passage for translation from English into French.

All Papers will be set in Irish and English. LATIN—(1) Questions in Latin to be answered in French; (2) A passage or passages from some other Latin work or works for translation as sight; (3) Short sentences, colloquial phrases, and a passage for translation from English into Latin.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL Scheme for University Scholarships in County Limerick.

I.—DATE OF OPERATION. For the present holders of Scholarships the regulations heretofore in force shall continue to apply. These new regulations shall come into operation in the Session (1921-22) for entrance Scholarships to be awarded in July 1921.

II.—NATURE AND VALUE OF THE SCHOLARSHIPS. a.—There shall be awarded four Scholarships in each year, tenable at any constituent College of the N.U.I. which has adopted the Gaelic League Programme.

III.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS. b.—Scholarships shall be restricted to students of Irish birth whose parents shall have resided in County Limerick for at least five years previous to the student presenting himself for examination.

IV.—ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS. Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £30 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £30, but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced amount.

V.—PARTICULAR CONDITIONS FOR ELIGIBILITY TO VARIOUS YEARS. a.—Age limit. Students shall be eligible for Scholarships up to, but not exceeding, 20 years of age on 1st June in each year, except in the case of Scholarships in Agriculture and in teaching.

VI.—ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. a.—Subjects. Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before presenting himself for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from his teacher or School Manager, also the certificate of his parish. He shall also produce a medical certificate as to fitness, and a birth certificate giving his name and address in their correct Irish form.

VII.—SUBJECTS FOR ENTRANCE EXAMINATION. The subjects of the examination shall be—Irish, Irish History, Latin, French, German, Italian, Spanish, Irish, Arithmetic and Algebra, Geometry, Trigonometry, Applied Mathematics, Domestic Science, Experimental Physics, Chemistry, Botany, Geography, Commerce.

VIII.—MATHMATICS. 1. Compound Interest: Profit and Loss: the use of Logarithms in the examination. 2. Graphical solutions of problems and interpretation of graphs may be required. 3. Present worth; Bankers' Discount; Stocks and Shares.

IX.—ALGEBRA.—1. Simple equations involving two or three unknown quantities and problems thereon; quadratic equations in a single unknown quantity and easy problems solvable by such equations; elementary theory of indices and logarithms. 2. Simultaneous equations of quadratic variables involving solution of simple quadratic equations; the theory of maxima and minima.

X.—GEOMETRY.—1. An account of geometrical knowledge will be given approximately equivalent to that contained in Book 1, Books 11, III, IV, and VI, and the definitions of Books V, Definitions. Students may be required to give algebraical proofs of these properties of proportional magnitudes.

HINTS FOR THE HOME. BY A PRACTICAL HOUSEWIFE. SOME SPRING CLEANING HINTS.

CLEANING CHIMNEYS. Smoke-blackened chimneys can be cleaned with a thick paste of soda and water. Apply this with a clean pad made of old woolen rags, and then thoroughly dry brush off with a soft brush.

FRESHENING WALLPAPER. Wallpaper can be freshened by being cleaned with a ball of wool. A few cupsful of plain flour mixed with water, kneaded well, and rubbed down the wall in long straight lines, will do the trick.

RENEWING PAINTWORK. Shabby paintwork can also be renewed. Wash the woodwork thoroughly; when quite dry apply a thin coat of "flat" paint, and when this is dry apply a coat of enamel paint.

THE GAS FITTINGS. When cleaning brass gas or electric light fittings, never use metal polish, as this spoils the lacquer. If they are very dirty, wash with a soft duster and water.

FOR WHITE PAINT. A simple and efficient way to clean white paint that is not very dirty is to dip a piece of clean damp flannel in a little white wine and rub over the surface lightly. It will leave the paint remarkably clean and new-looking.

TO CLEAN LEAD SINKS. An ounce of soda, two ounces of soft soap, a pennyworth of dried flower earth, stirred in a pint and a half of water, makes an excellent mixture to clean leaden sinks. A little laid on a flannel will be enough each time.

WHITEWASH AS GOOD AS PAINT. The following is the recipe for the Scotch holder for a whitewash which will withstand the weather almost as well as paint, and is therefore suitable for outside work. Shake in boiling water half a bushel of lime, strain it, and add two pounds of sulphate of zinc, one pound of common salt, and half a pound of whiting, thoroughly dissolved. Mix the whole to a proper consistency with skin milk, and apply with a brush.

CRACKS IN FURNITURE. Cracks in furniture can be so filled with beeswax that the marks will scarcely show at all. First slightly soften the beeswax until it becomes like putty. Then press it freely and neatly into the cracks, and smooth the surface over with a thin knife and varnish it, and the cracks will disappear. AN IRISH PEACE. Hopeful Development.

Invitation from the Premier To Mr De Valera and Sir James Craig.

The Press Association on Saturday evening received the following copy of a letter which Mr Lloyd George has addressed to Mr De Valera and Sir James Craig:

"Sir,—The British Government are deeply anxious that so far as they can ensure it, the King's appeal for reconciliation in Ireland shall not have been made in vain. Rather than allow yet another opportunity of settlement in Ireland to be lost, they feel it incumbent upon them to make a final appeal in the spirit of the King's words for a conference between the representatives of Southern and Northern Ireland. I write, therefore, to convey the following invitation to you, as the chosen leader of the great majority in Southern Ireland, and to Sir James Craig, the Premier of Northern Ireland— (1) That you should attend a conference here in London, in company with Sir James Craig, to explore to the utmost the possibility of a settlement.

"We make this invitation with a fervent desire to see the reasons of the King's appeal for reconciliation in Ireland accepted by the peoples of these two islands, who ought to live in neighbourly harmony with each other, and whose co-operation would mean so much not only to the Empire but to humanity.

"The following reply has been sent to Mr Lloyd George by Sir James Craig:— My Dear Prime Minister,—I am in receipt of your letter of the 24th inst., conveying an invitation to a conference in London at an early date. I avail myself of your courtesy to intimate that I am summoning a meeting of my Cabinet for Tuesday, when I hope to be able to obtain the presence of all the members, and you may rest assured that no time will be lost in intimating the result of our deliberations.—JAMES CRAIG.

MR DeValera to Consult His Colleagues.

A correspondent writing from Dublin on Sunday night said:—Mr De Valera arrived Mass this morning at Blackrock College, where he was formerly a master, and breakfasted at the College. He expressed himself confident as to the outcome of the present situation.

THE IMPORTATION OF STORE CATTLE. Ireland and the Embargo.

At the Royal Commission on the Importation of Store Cattle, on Friday, Colonel O'Callaghan Westropp was, at the request of Mr J. Aspinall (counsel), granted permission to make a statement with reference to the evidence of Mr William Henderson, who had stated that he alone had been associated in the question of the embargo, and that farmers in favour of the removal of the embargo had written to him, stating "that it would not be safe for them to give any evidence in favour of the embargo."

FUNERAL OF MR J. WALSH.

The remains of the late Mr John Walsh, Lower Market Street, were interred on Sunday, June 19th, in Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. There was a very large and representative attendance at the funeral, which took place at 3 o'clock from St. Michael's Catholic Church. The Secretaries of the Arch-Confraternity of the Holy Family acted as pall-bearers, while many members of the Confraternity, of which the deceased was a devoted member, walked in the cortege.

ENNIS SHOOTING. Official Report.

The following account was issued from Dublin Castle on Saturday of Friday's shooting at Ennis when a boy was killed and a woman and two civilians wounded.—At 3.45 p.m. yesterday two civilians, named O'Keefe and Keane, of Kilmannagh, were party to learn two R.I.C. constables, who were shopping in the town, one of the policemen was knocked down by his assailant, but both succeeded in retaining their revolvers. The assailants then fled, and were pursued by the constables, who fired at them as they were running away, wounding both of them. Unfortunately one woman, Miss Heavey, of No. 1, was wounded, and a boy named Patrick, 15 years of age, was killed by the police fire. The constables arrested Keefe and Keane, and they were taken to hospital.

THE "WEST CAPE" IN LIMERICK. Coal for Gas Works.

The freight steamer "West Cape," with a cargo of 1,500 tons of coals for the Limerick Gas Committee, and a similar quantity for the Limerick Steamship Co., arrived in port on Thursday evening, and entered dock at half-past nine. She belongs to the United States Shipping Board, and is being chartered for the Limerick trade. She is a steel vessel, with a length of 420 feet overall, a breadth of 54 feet, and depth of 27 feet. Her registered tonnage is 5,619 tons, and her dead weight capacity is up to 10,000 tons. She left Baltimore on the 27th May, and proceeded to Limerick, where part of her cargo was discharged. She then went to Swansea for to discharge another part of her cargo, and the balance of her freight coal is being unloaded at Limerick.

THE COMET AND METEORS.

About the 28th, in the early night, there may be a fall of meteors, as we shall be no more than one million miles from the tail of the comet. The radiant point will be towards the wall-tower constellation, the Plough, and a watch round at the 28th may reward the patient stargazer, granting the night is fine, and they don't disappear.—J. F.
