The Unemployed.

Thirteen weeks ago, when the coal stoppage began, the number of registered unemployed was 1,305,830. Last Friday, the figures now show, the estimated total was 2,178,000, not including miners. In addition there are nearly a million people working on short time.

U.S.A. 'INDEPENDENCE DAY.'

U.S.A. "Independence Day" was welcomed by the crew of the American steamer "West Cape" with much rejoicing on Sunday night, and the celebration kept up until yesterday morning.

ST MUGHIN'S CHURCH FETE.

The Garden Fete for St Mughin's new church which had been postponed owing to the 7 p.m. curfew, will be held on the 14th, 15th, and 16th July on the grounds of St Mughin's College.

THE CITY SHOOTING.

Man Succumbs to Wounds. The young man David Carroll who was wounded by a bullet on Saturday evening, the 25th ult., while within a short distance from his home in Athlone street, died in Barrington's Hospital on Sunday. Deceased, who was an unmarried man, at the time he was shot bore the right knee into the line of fire. He was taken to the Military Hospital, New Barracks, and removed to Barrington's Hospital on Tuesday.

THE WATER SUPPLY.

The Waterworks Committee of the Limerick Corporation announce by poster that the city water supply is to be available for only seven hours each day out of the twenty four until further notice.

WEST LIMERICK CREAMERY RE-OPENED.

Devon road, West Limerick, Creamery, which has been closed by proclamation for some time past, has again been re-opened.

LIMERICK SUMMER ASSIZES.

Judges and Peace Prospects. Mr Justice Pim, attended by the County High Sheriff, Mr Gerald E Goodbody, and the Under-Sheriff, Mr Benjamin K Lucas, entered the Crown Court at 11 o'clock to-day, and proceeded to open the Summer Assizes for the County of Limerick.

CITY COMMISSION.

Lord Chief Justice's Hope

At 11 o'clock this morning, the Right Hon Lord Chief Justice Molony, who was accompanied by Mr M P Bingham, City High Sheriff, opened the Assize Commission for the City of Limerick.

THE OOLA AMBUSH.

Sequel to Train Hold-up.

Two Policemen Killed—Three Wounded Seriously. In connection with the hold-up of a goods train at Boherdoo, between Limerick Junction and Oola, on Saturday morning, it appears as a police party from Oola approached the scene along the railway line they were attacked by five men.

Official Report.

A Dublin Castle report says—a party of R.I.C. and a sergeant, were engaged upon the investigation of the burning of a quantity of goods at Oola, Co Limerick, yesterday when the constables—Kenya, Queen's Co.; Sinnott, London; Noyce, Salisbury; Kneile, Monchester; Symonds, South of England. The two killed and three of the wounded were conveyed to Limerick. Kneile is reported to be seriously wounded.

Funeral of Sergeant Johnstone and Constable Hill.

The remains of the late Sergeant A Johnstone and Constable Hill, who were killed in the ambush, were removed yesterday from the military mortuary, New Barracks, Limerick, and the remains were conveyed to the railway station for interment at Mountmellick and Liverpool respectively.

Wounded Constables.

The three constables wounded at Oola on Saturday were reported to-day to be fairly well. They are being treated at the military hospital, New Barracks, where they receive every care.

IRISH PEACE MOVE.

Dublin Conference. An Adjournment to Friday. Certain Agreements Reached. The important discussions between Mr De Valera and Mr A Griffith on one side; and on the other Lord Midleton, Sir M Dockrell, Sir R Woods, and Mr A Jamison, took place at the Mansion House, Dublin, yesterday.

Official Statement.

The following official statement was issued from the Mansion House at 2.45:—The Faculty Department of Dail Eireann issued the following statement:—The informal Conference called by President De Valera was held this morning at the Mansion House. The Earl of Midleton, Sir Robert Woods, Sir Mauricos Dockrell, and Mr Andrew Jamison were present.

Unionists Pleased.

Deputation to Sir J. Craig. The Central News says—Lord Midleton and his Central friends are very pleased that the Mansion House looked bright and cheerful. There were many friends awaiting them, who eagerly shook them by the hand, while a large crowd gave vociferous cheers, which the recipients smilingly acknowledged.

General Smuts and Sir James Craig

It was reported from Dublin yesterday, that General Smuts had gone to Belfast to see Sir James Craig. A London correspondent says that it was admitted last night in Government circles that he had gone to Ireland.

Lord Mayor's Cheery Words.

Later in the afternoon the Lord Mayor presided at the quarterly meeting of the Dublin Corporation in the Mansion House. Replying to a vote of thanks for his address, he said, "I am bringing the drapers' dispute to a close, and I am bringing that at the moment peace was in the air. During the last three or four hours in the drawing room of the Mansion House one of the most important and momentous conferences ever held in the country has taken place."

LIMERICK HARBOUR BOARD.

MR L. MOFFY presided at the meeting of the Limerick Harbour Board yesterday. There were also present—Mrs R Crowe, Messrs G R Goodbody, G R Ryan, C S Alderman F Jones, and D Griffin, B.C. The officials in attendance were—Messrs J F Power (Secretary), H V Morony (Engineer), and Captain A Fitzmaurice (Harbour Master).

GRONDING OF A VESSEL.

A letter was read from the Glasgow agents of the Ketch "Leader," complaining that while the vessel was negotiating the Shannon with a cargo she grounded and sustained extensive damage, and also sustained damage to her cargo.

TELEGRAPHIC DELAY.

It is intimated this evening that there is very considerable telegraphic delay between Dublin, and London, which accounts for the brevity of our telegrams, raising and general, in this issue.

A CONCEALED TRENCH.

An convoy of police from Listowel ran into a trench on Sunday outside Newcastle West. Two constables were seriously injured, and District Inspector Bygott and three other constables slightly, while the car in which they were travelling was badly damaged. The trench is said to have been concealed.

FATAL ENCOUNTER IN THE CITY.

Two of the crew of an American steamer in the docks quarrelled last evening, James Godley and James Dargan, men of colour. Godley was stabbed with a knife in the right groin, and died of his wounds. He was removed to Barrington's Hospital, where he died late last night. Dargan was arrested and committed to prison.

THE TEST MATCHES.

In the cricket test match, England's first innings closed for 259. Hobbs batted and did not bat. Australia, in their second innings, have lost two wickets for 143.

KIDNAPPED J.P. RELEASED.

About midday on Sunday, Mr John St Ledger-Gilman, of The Retreat, Clonsilla, who was kidnapped about three weeks ago, was released and returned to his home.

CORN PRODUCTION REPEAL ACT.

The second reading of the Corn Production Repeal Act was taken in the House of Commons yesterday. Under it guaranteed prices, control of cultivation, and wages boards disappear.

IRISH RAILWAYS BILL.

The Ministry of Transport expects that the Irish Railways Bill will be introduced in the House of Commons in the near future. The bill is now being drafted, and the representatives of the Irish Companies returned to London yesterday for discussions with the Transport Ministry on matters of comparative minor importance in connection with the terms of settlement.

CITY POOR LAW GUARDIAN ARRESTED.

Mr Morgan Castellon, P.L.G., was arrested by Crown forces at his residence, Charles Quay, last night and taken to Mary-street police barracks. The charge, if any, against him is not known.

YOUNG WOMAN WOUNDED IN DUBLIN.

During some excitement in Dublin last night after the seizure of a Sinn Fein flag in Dominick-street a shot was fired and a young woman was wounded.

EX-NAVAL MAN SHOT.

Richard Cusack, an ex-naval man, was shot through the stomach whilst resting in a field at Ballycotton, Co Cork, on Sunday night, reputedly by a Sinn Fein man.

ENNIS LADY ORDERED TO LEAVE TOWN.

Mrs O'Donnor, proprietress of the Old Ground Hotel, Ennis, has been served by the authorities with a notice to leave Ennis and take up residence in Tralee district in a few days, reporting there to the police. This notice was lately received.

PROHIBITING BICYCLES IN EAST LIMERICK.

Proclamations under Martial Law have been posted up in Kiltallick, Bruff, Hospital, and other parts of East Limerick, prohibiting the use of pedal bicycles in the district.

LIMERICK CITY GRAND JURY

And Peace Prospects. At the Limerick City Assize Commission to-day the following resolution was passed by the Grand Jury:—That we, the Grand Jurors of the City of Limerick, functioning at the Summer Assize, 1921, desire to express our keen satisfaction at the prospect of an immediate conference taking place between the Prime Minister and the Irish political leaders for the purpose of arranging the terms of peace; that it is our earnest desire that such a conference be held, as we believe it would result in quickly ending the present terrible and deplorable state of affairs, and establish again under God the blessings of peace, stable government, and renewed prosperity to our native land.

LORD CASTLEMAINE'S RESIDENCE BURNED TO THE GROUND.

Dublin, Monday.—Myrum Castle, near Athlone, the residence of Lord Castlemaine, was burned to the ground yesterday by sixty armed men. The damage is estimated at £120,000.—Central News.

REPORTED INTENDED RELEASE OF LORD BANDON.

Referring to the Irish peace proposals, the Parliamentary correspondent of the "Times" says:—A large amount of optimism may be traced in the information that the release of Lord Bandon, Castle Bernard, Lord Bandon's home in Co Cork, was set on fire, it will be remembered, by Sinn Feiners on a June 21, and Lord Bandon was carried off in a motor car.

MEAT FOR MARINES.

Raided at Miltown-Malbay. A Miltown-Malbay telegram says:—A meat car owned by a victualler at Miltown-Malbay was held up by armed men on Saturday night. The meat was taken by the travelling public. The Marines at Sandiford, Quilty, was taken away. All the other meat was left untouched. It is stated that the victualler, with some shopkeepers at Quilty, were cautioned not to supply the Marines with any foodstuffs. A local carpenter at Miltown-Malbay was also cautioned not to work at the Marine Station.

CLARE AMBUSH.

An ambush took place on Saturday between Crown forces and civilians, says a Miltown-Malbay telegram yesterday. The casualties, if any, are unknown, and it is extremely hard to get anything like a definite account of the occurrence, which has given rise to much conjecture. The scene of the ambush is ten miles from Miltown-Malbay, and five miles from Ennistymon.

EXPRESS PASSENGER SERVICE VIA NORTH WALL AND HOLYHEAD.

Since the recent strike, the L. & N.W. Co. have carried on the service by means of the mail service via Kingstown and Holyhead.

CUTTING A GIRL'S HAIR OFF IN WEST CLARE.

Damages increased at Clare Assizes.

At the Clare Assizes on Saturday, before Mr Justice Finn, Miss Annie O'Shea appeared against a decree for £500 by the County Court Judge in the case of West, West Clare, in December last. Mr G O'Callaghan, instructed by Mr M O'Shea, for Mr O'Callaghan, who said in reply to Mr O'Callaghan that on this date in December about twelve men came into her house producing knives and razors and treated her and her mother with great indignity. She had been in a house of Mr Sheehan, and as she passed in there were some policemen and soldiers there. A policeman snatched her, and she returned the salute. About ten days afterwards she was in her own house with her mother and her four brothers. Her brother went out and she remained in the house with her mother, who was aged about 70. She heard the dogs making a great noise and she went to quieten them. Then she saw a man come in by the back, and when she asked him who he was, he said he was Mr O'Callaghan. Then a man came over with the four police, and she tried to fight, but he put a cloth over her mouth and held her head. Then a whole lot of them came into the kitchen—about twelve of them. Her mother thought to come between them, but he put her down with the gun he had. All had big sticks, and one had a revolver, and one had a scissor. She was pulled into the middle of the floor, and one began to pull out a pin in her hair. She asked what she had done, but the man to whom she spoke made no answer. The man with the scissor began to cut the hair around her head. He asked her what she was doing with the four police, and then with the five police in Kiltash. The man then came opposite her with the revolver and said he was prepared to shoot her dead. She was afraid to speak, and she collapsed. They went away after a few days after she went to the priest and complained to him. She said to him they had her wronged, that she was not speaking to the police. She was laid up for a month, and she could not use her arm properly. She sent three times to Dr Daly's place, and he came to her. How does your head feel now?—I got a great good when my hair was cut, and one side is partly dead yet. Mr Callaghan remarked his client only got £200, while another girl got £400 for having her hair cut in the same way. Applicant said this was so. To Mr O'Callaghan—There was a marriage on foot at the time, but it came to nothing since, she was hardly able to sleep well since then. His Lordship, in increasing the amount to £100, said this was an abominable thing to do to the girl. He allowed £25 expenses.

LIMERICK COUNTY COUNCIL

Scheme for Scholarships From Primary to Secondary Schools in County Limerick.

I.—NUMBER OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

Six of the annual value of £40. The Committee shall be at liberty to reduce the value of the Scholarship where the pupil's parents or guardians are in a position to bear part of the expense of his or her education. The Committee shall, likewise, have power to make a supplementary grant not exceeding £10 per annum towards the maintenance of any scholar whose parents are unable to meet the expenses incidental to residence in a Secondary School.

II.—CONDITIONS OF TENURE.

(1) The Primary School from which the pupil comes must have adopted the Gaelic League Education Programme as modified by Dail Eireann, viz., (a) Irish to be the official school language, i.e. Irish to be used for Roll Calls, prayers, &c. (b) Irish to be taught for vocational use to each child for at least one hour per day. (c) Irish History to be taught to all pupils. (d) All parents or guardians, whose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gaelic League Programme for Secondary Schools, viz., Irish to be taught to all pupils for vocational use. (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) The Secondary School which the pupil, or his parents or guardians, choose for the holding of a Scholarship shall have adopted (a) the Gaelic League Programme for Secondary Schools, viz., Irish to be taught to all pupils for vocational use. (b) Irish history to be taught to all pupils. (c) The examination papers to be set in both English and Irish each pupil examined to have permission to answer in whichever of the two languages he may think fit. In examinations in a foreign language the use of that foreign language to be permitted in setting and answering questions. The pupil to be taught at the Secondary School with a view to Matriculation at the N.U.I.

III.—TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

The tenure of these Scholarships shall be four years provided the pupil shows satisfactory progress as tested by (a) the periodical school examination; (b) the annual school examination at the end of the second year; (c) the special test in Irish and Irish History applied by the Committee's Examiner at the end of each year, (d) a satisfactory report from the Examining Board of a Gaelic College, where the pupil will spend a session in the summer of each year at the expense of the Committee; (e) the pupil shall be able to be taught through the medium of Irish. The courses for the Special History Examinations are:—At the end of First Year—Story of Ireland (tested Billogally) of Beate Naomh Padraig—Billogally. At the end of Second Year—Micheal's History of Ireland and Stair na hEireann Part I (History of the Gaelic) At the end of Third Year—Last Conquest and Sean A'Dainials, "Eire" (Conan Maol). At the end of Fourth Year—The Irish Wars, by J J O'Connell, M.A., and Sothair ar Sean I gcoin. By Sean O'Ceallaigh, B.D.

IV.—RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATIONS.

Scholarships shall be restricted to pupils who are of Irish birth and whose parents or guardians have been resident in the County for five years.

V.—OTHER QUALIFICATIONS.

Children of labourers or farmers whose valuation does not exceed £20 shall be entitled to a full Scholarship. Children of farmers whose valuation exceeds £20 but does not exceed £50 may, at the discretion of the Committee, receive a reduced Scholarship, the value of which shall be determined by the Committee with a view to the parents' circumstances. Children of others than farmers or labourers may be awarded a Scholarship (full or reduced) at the Committee's sole discretion, according to the circumstances of the parents.

VI.—AGE LIMIT.

Pupils shall be eligible for Scholarships up to but not exceeding 16 years on the first of June.

Every candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination, produce a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his school, together with a medical certificate as to fitness, and a recommendation from a Clergyman of his parish as to character.

VIII.—AWARDS.

Scholarships shall be awarded strictly in order of merit, &c.

IX.—EXAMINATION.

Candidates for Scholarships shall be subjected to a competitive examination—oral and written—to be held by Examiners appointed by the Committee.

X.—GENERAL POWERS.

The Committee reserve to themselves the right to exclude any candidate from competing for a Scholarship without assigning a reason. The Committee also reserve the right to revise this Scheme or any part of it at any time, subject to the sanction of the Limerick County Council.

SYLLABUS.

The following is the list of subjects for examination (written and oral) as may be necessary:—IRISH, IRISH HISTORY, LATIN, FRENCH, ARITHMETIC, ALGEBRA, GEOGRAPHY, BOTANY, DOMESTIC SCIENCE, RURAL SCIENCE, GEOMETRY, and ENGLISH. Irish and Irish History are essential; any other three subjects from the foregoing list. 100 marks will be assigned to each subject. No award will be made to any candidate who has not passed in each of the five subjects (30% and secured at least 250 marks out of the aggregate 500.

Reader.

ALGEBRA—Four Primary Rules. Decimals and Fractions with simple problems thereon. Simple percentages (profit and loss). The Unitary System.

GEOGRAPHY—General—The Map of the World and Ireland; Special—Ireland, her ancient and modern Divisions, Great Rivers, Harbours, Mountains, Towns, Bogs, Mines, and other products. More particular knowledge of the County of Limerick.

GEOMETRY—Euclid—Books I and II.

BOTANY—(a) Terms—Root, Stem, Leaf, Stipules, Bracts, Flower, Calyx, Corolla, Stamens, Pistils, Fruit, Seed, Receptacle and Nectary; (b) To recognise fifty plants; to know their names in Irish and English; (c) To be able to give a brief account of the locality and uses of twenty plants; (d) Four Nat. orders, twelve specimens from each with Irish and local names.

RURAL SCIENCE—(1) Examination of a simple plant and its parts; (2) Flowers—their structure and uses; (3) Fruits—disposal of seeds and uses of fruits; (4) Winter twigs and buds; (5) Seeds and germination; (6) Work of roots, stems and leaves; (7) Plant propagation; (8) Climate and weather—weather charts; (9) Construction and uses of barometer and thermometer—hygrometer and rain gauge; (10) Study of the soil, how formed, erosion and denudation, sedimentary rocks and rocks of vegetable origin; (11) Recognition of common wild flowers, shrubs and trees with their Irish names; (12) With special reference to the soil and geological formation of Co. Limerick.
